<u>COOPERS HOLE</u>. 20ff of the rail have now been laid down in Coopers.

TACKLE As a result of the vote taken at the talk on Tackle Making the club is to make 250 feet of 10" spaced ladder.

#### CAVE LEADERSHIE

Basic Rules to be accepted by all cave leaders.

Before entering a cave make sure-

1. That you have some idea of where you are going, how long you will be and that someone reliable on the surface knows this information.

2. That your party is strong enough to tackle the trip envisaged, remembering that a team is as strong as its weakest member.

3. That everyone in the party has at least two reliable forms of lighting, excluding candles, and that they carry sufficient carbide and batteries for more that the proposed length of time to be spent underground.

4. That every member of the party is properly clothed eg. boots, boiler suit if possible, and that whistles are carried when necessary.

5. That food and first aid equipment are carried as required.

6. That sufficient tackle for laddering all pitches on which ladders are normally used is carried and that it is in good condition. Also that lifelines are carried sufficient for every pitch.

7. That you have sufficient confidence that everyone in your party will obey any orders and decisions that you might have to give or make.

8. That you know and that your party know what to do in the event of an accident with regard to location of telephone  $etc_{\bullet}$ 

## Down the cave.

1 J 1. Watch every member of the party for tiredness and be prepared to turn back at any point, being tactful and having regard for the feelings of any person who may feel he has let down the rest of the team.

2. Give everyone in the party a definite order and insist that they remain in that place unless you state otherwise or in cases of emergency

3. Never refuse a lifeline to anyone who genuinely asks for one

4. Give orders concisely and clearly and expect them to be obeyed. Never give an order that you do not mean.

On returning to the surface.

1. Make sure that those responsible for the knowledge of you descent know that you. have come out.

2. That the farmer has been paid when required 

3. That the cave has been locked when required and that no other party is down there.

4. That before you go down and when you return make sure that no one is a nuisance to the farmer and that no un-necessary noise is made, especially when you surface late at night.

CLUB CAVE LEADERSHIP . In the past and in some cases very recently correct cave leadership has in some instances been non-existant. **-** . . . . . .

It is not everyone that can lead a caving team and not everyone that wants to. When a person is accepted as a member of the club he can not be expected to be a suitable leader by virtue of his membership. If this was the case membership would only be open to experienced good cave leaders, and the club would find it difficult to exist.

The problem of cave leadership has been discussed at long length by the Committee and they have that the best way to ensure safe or as safe as possible, caving trips is to compile a list of those members of the club. whom the committee consider suitable leaders. This list may be changed at anytime by the Committee and if anyone on it wishes to be taken off or anyone not on it wishes to be placed on it they should apply to the Hon. Secretary who will put it before the Committee. 

In future any caving trip led my members or anyone else from the cottage must have as its leader one of the following members. This does not apply to other clubs who might be staying at the cottage and cave in the name of some other club. and the second second second

PROPOSALS FOR AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION & RULES To be brought up at the Annual General Meeting.

Membership.

•Four classes. A. Probationary B. Full C. Associate D. Honor:ry

Only full members may propose for membership any prospective member. Thus B. should read. Probationary members shall be persons who have attended at least one Group Meet at which Committee Members are present. They shall be proposed by two full members and their names shall then go before the committee and id accepted they shall remain as probationary members for the period of one year. They shall have full voting rights but may not stand on the committee. At they and of one year they shall be proposed as full members by the Committee.

Subscriptions.

Subscriptions shall be paid on the 1st Jan. and members failing to pay bt 31st Jan will be suspended and at the discretion of the committee are liable to loose their membership. Members under the age of 18 shall pay 6/- a year, those over the age of 18 shall pay 21/- per year. Those SPONSORS Owing to the fact that two of the Club sponsors are unable to cave regularly on Mendip, in future the Sponsors will be the six members of the Committe and Malcolm Cotter.
