<u>UBLEY BONES</u> A further and more reliable opinion on the age of the bones has revealed that they are not as re valuable as was at first supposed. This does not however, rule out the possibility that there are not other bones to be found, and for this reason all cavers are asked to be especially careful when visiting the cave.

Some members have recently been prospecting for further passages. If any new discoveries are to be made it is believed that a great deal of very difficult digging will be need to be done.

<u>CARBIDE</u> This is now being sold at the cottage in plastic bags. The price is 1/- per pound or 3d per fill. This service is not only for members so anyone calling at the cottage may take advantage. (Cotter business deal No,99.)
