WEEKEND LEGGG TOURSE AT REELE.

A SUPER CAVING ORGANISATION - OR NOT?.

A discussion was held at the last M.C.G. general mesting to decide whether or not the group should support or encourage the formation of national or regional caving organisations. There have been a number of developements since then, and they are outlined here.

The Council of Northern Caving Clubs (of which the M.C.G. is an associate member with voting rights) has circulated all caving clubs in the country asking (1) Is a national caving body necessary? (2) Should there be regional caving bodies based on the main areas? (3) Are clubs prepared to join

together for this purpose, or adapt existing groups? First opinions sent to the Council favour a national body run regionally by a new association, or those existing. The objects of the new group are obscure, but their principal aims would seem to be co-ordinating access questions and advising outside organisations on training.

It should be appreciated that this idea comes from the North of England, where relations with landowners are less friendly than in the south. For example, a landowner recently "blew up" the entrance to a cave to prevent its further use after and accident. It is thought by some that a national body might be a more influential megotiator and perhaps bring pressure to bear on the Goverbment or some other body to preserve caves as "places of national interest"

A number of Mendip clubs feel that this national body, if formed, would interfere with their internal organisation and some ways a north-south battle is beginning. There is a proposal to form a "COUNCIL OF SOUTHERN CAVING CLUBS", of all groups 'south of the Trent' to negotiate with the northerners.

Your committee has asked the leading lights of the proposed CSCC to call a meeting to discuss aims and objects and we have said that we do not wish to see north-south warfare develop.

proposal that either the Cave Research Group or the British Speliological sociation should be the new national body has been discouraged as the CRG's constitution limits its activities to "research" and the BSA has individuals as members as well as clubs, and this is thought unsuitable.

Person lly, I expect that regional bodies will come into being, whatever we think and pitimately national bodies too. We must make sure that they serve only a useful purpose and do not inferfere with clubs' internal affairs.
