Opening Time Disease.

By our special Medical Correspondent.

Reports of the incidence of this disease in Agen Allwedd (Newsletter 25) should not alarm members or discourage them from caving.

Statistical evidence shows that those on the surface catch it just as quickly as those underground, and above ground its most severe effects are, in fact, suffered more quickly. For the guidance of members the symptoms of the underground variety are as follows; unquenchable thirst between two and four hours after entering the cave; sudden unreasonable hatrod of cold water; physical abhorrence of slimy foul and, rapid dimming of lights. Only cure is to get lost, or for lying leader to tell you that there is a barrel at inner end of cave. Also recommended, rapidly make way to nearest medicine shop for six pints of medicine. REVIEW

"Studies in Sr eleology. Vol. 1. Part 1."

At long last, the first journal of the A.P.C.R.C has been published. This publication should help dispel, the many pessimists and antagonists of that organisation. It is true that an unfortunate bias towards the biological sciences occurs in this first issue, but the quality of the articles and the presentation have set very high standards. Future 'studies', it is hoped, will present a more balanced review of specifical knowledge and research.

The underlying theme to the articles is conservation in its broadest sense. 'Conservation has been defined as the widest use of natural resources'. We must surely wish the Association success in their efforts to present to the caving public this new high level of caving literature and their purpose of education in matters of conservation. The main articles deal with a variety of subjects ranging from Bats (J. H. D. Hooper) to Interpretation of Archaecicgical deposits in caves (Dr. A. Rosenfeld). There is also a fascinating account of a cave dwelling New Zealand glow worm, and an interesting account of the work of the Nature Conservancy of Gt. Britain with reference to caves. I am sure it is not widely known that such well known systems as Swildons, St. Cuthberts, and Stoke Lane are protected by the Conservancy.

Dr. A. J. Sutcliffe should be congratulated for the months of hard work he has put into the Association and this publication. Copies are available free to members or 25s to non-members.
