Gaping Ghyll or A Ride on a Wench (sorry Wi.ch Ed)

Following on from a breakfast at'The Three Peaks'. Pete Mathews, Greg Smith, Don Vosper and Rog Wallingtom set off for Ingleborough and Gaping Ghyll. We waved the blessing of the bifurcated digits to John Evans and Bryan Pittman and left them to Heron Pot.

Once at the entrance to the great shaft but not without the puffing and panting on the way up, we sat down. And, for the next half hour we watched on the activities of the winch, trying all the time to pluck up enough courage to make the descent ourselves. We need not have worried for when it came to paying our ten bobs (available for an unspecified runber of trips during WHitsun) we found ourselves at the end of a two hour queue. The wait was only involved on the descent, for the chair was coming up empty on the return journey.

The wait for the winch decided us on a trip via Bar Pot. Here the scene was much the same. A half hour wait at the entrance and another at the top of the 110ft pitch slowed us up. The high spot of the trip being the descent of the latter pitch. A superb view was enjoyed from two ledges about 15 and 30 feet down----pant---pant. The free hanging pitch is quite dry, and is perfectly circular, being some thirty feet in diameter. "I say fellahs I'm just pausing a mo' to admire the fine fluting on the walls of this pot, -Thinks, --- Cripes, I can't hang on to this ladder much longer. These thoughts only became increasingly certain during the next eighty feet. When he finally did reach the bottom our cave photographer immediately fell flat on his back. This was mainly due to exhaustion, but this position also gave the best view up the shaft of the others coming down.

From the bottom of Bar Pot we followed an assortment of dry passages before coming out into the Main Chamber. Again we paused for photographs with illumination from someone elses flash powder. Where next? We paused for deliberation and locked at a bunch of blokes in the middle of the chamber. They appeared to be waiting for something to happen - in the next moment a chair came down from the roof and after an exchange of occupants it returned to where it came from.

We hade no food with us and a long delay in getting out would have meant a hungry night. Our minds were quickly made up by the sight of hordes coming in from every direction. Each with one thought in mind - to get the hell out of it before the pubs shut. Even so we still had to wait an hour (five minutes later and it would have been two). Our wait at the bottom was partly relieved by a jug of steaming soup which came down from heaven. As more people joined the queue we mustered a choir - the beautiful singing was even heared by the people at the top of the winch, 370 feet above; they sent down a request for it to stop.

Obviously the assent of the main shaft was the climax (twang) of the trip. The couple of minutes (twang) to reach the top were pretty hectic. With a camera in one hand a flash gun in the other, and a mouthfull of flashbulbs, photographs were snapped in all (twang) directions. The ride in varying degrees of daylight (twang) all the way, will remain one of our most impressive caving experiences. The only disturbing feature of the winch ride was an uncomfortable 'twang8 from the cable, as it changed layers on the take up drum.

I think we were glad we came out when we did as we ended the day with a steak at Whoop Hall.

However the tether suspending the ladder broke! This incident has made it quite plain that livelines should be used on even the shortest pitches as a precaution against any mechanical failures that may occur in the equipment being used as well as a guard against a slip or fatigue! It is all important that vtethers should not be Kinked or rusty and that though the safety factor of a tether may be more than ample the ladder is only effectively suspended by one piece of wire! Should there be a secondary form of suspension, food for thought.
