Access to G.B. may soon be a lot easier. Charterhouse Caving Committee are negotiating with Bristol University S.S. over the issue of keys to founder clubs. Arrangements would then be similar to those in existence for Longwood.

Brian Hammond is at present in New Zealand. He has visited Harwood Hole (342 m dee, though there is an easier way in). This follows from a period of V.S.O. in Fiji.

A small party of MCG were fortunate enough to be present at Penwyllt on 12th June; the weekend after the breakthrough of a dry route from O.F.D. I to O.F.D.II.

In OFD I the main passage passes by the sump to <u>Waterfall Series</u> and <u>Boulder Chamber</u>. This chamber contains a large collapse of boulders, but a route through them leads to <u>Hush Sump</u> and <u>Dip Sump</u>. To the left of <u>Dip Sump</u> a small passage previously packed with boulders had been damming back a vast quantity of mud.

When SWCC began digging away the boulders the

mud finally broke through opening a route into OFD II.

About 100 feet of muddy passage leads to a crawl and a high aven - this aven is the same as that noticed on the <u>Divers Route</u> from <u>Dip Sump</u> to <u>Collapse</u> Chamber. The aven is climbed for about 20 feet to where a small passage leads to a pile of bruised boulders - the bottom of Coronation Aven.

From here the way on is through <u>Collapse</u>
Chamber and into a small unnamed chamber. The exit is
through a well concealed slot about 15 feet from the floor.
This eventually leads to <u>Diver's Pot</u> (55 feet). And from
here the passages assume larger proportions to <u>Picea dilly</u>
and <u>The Smithy</u>. The route we took at this point was to the

Pub via Cwm Dwr.

NOTES

1. Any party going from I to II or II to I must be in the care of a leader for I.

2. A party intending to visit the connection must inform Mr. Barrows at Yr Grithig. He takes his water from the surface rising and requires notice so that he can fill his water tank. before the water becomes muddy.

3. Cars should not be parked at Yr Grithig by any

party making a through trip.

Access arrangements in South Wales are :-

Dan yr Ogof with leader

Cwm Dwr (or Quarry Cave) is now gated except at weekends.

Cathedral Cave or did you call it Tunnel Cave? It is now a show cave and the bottom entrance may only be used by parties with a leader. The top entrance is free access; but is now gated - SWGC hold the key.

in the area - Black Shiver Pot. At the bottom of the ot a shallow stream enters from under a low wall, only to disappear into a tight bedding plane. The stream leads along a flat out crawl for

a few feet, and one can then Proceed on hands and knees. It is not long, however, before roof and floor approach each other again; and, here our travelling embolism "Wol" became stuck fast. As luck would have it there is now a modern, dual carriage by pass leading off on the right hand side - this is conjectured in the U.L.S.A. survey.


The first pitch of 40 feet is quickly reached. And with short pitches following at regular intervals the descent began to develop into a real 'fun trip'. Amusement ceased as, one by one, we arrived at the bottom of the 13 feet pitch leading to the top of the inky Black Rift. Careless banter stopped and a stone tossed into the void, hit the floor after 4 or 5 seconds. (4.09 secs. Ed.)

By crawling along the well protected lip to the left of the rift we arrived at the Eagle's Nest. And from here 90 feet of ladder was enough to reach a point where two huge boulders, could be seen, jammed across the shaft far below.

Following an awkward take off the ladder hung nicely away from the wall, until after 83 feet one could step out onto a wide ledge. This was followed to the jammed boulders some 20 feet away. The lower pitch was laddered directly from a rock flake on the traverse - next to the first jammed boulder. In wetter weather it would be prudent to belay the ladder to the boulders themselves for a reasonably dry descent. The climb was magnificent; the ladder hanging free between the walls of the rift ten feet on either side. Halfway down the stream, now dispersed into

a heavy rain, hit the ladder in a most refreshing manner

Resting at the bottom, one had time to look around and reflect that the limestone was of a silvery brown hue and not the hostile black one pictures from its name. It is at the bottom of the Black Rift that all the effort put into the upper reaches of the pot can be pleasantly rewarded. Individually, we trogged off under the falling water. A short duck led into a superb stream passage lined with clean flow stone. It took deceptively long to reach the last pitch since we forced back to hands and knees: The canal leading to the final sump is directly below the final pitch. All good things must come to an end and so we turned back for the return.

The pot is on truely classic lines and was thought by every one to be one of the most rewarding systems we have yet descended. Black Shiver is very high on our list of future trips.

NOTE

- 1) A whistle is essential in Black Rift due to poor acoustics.
- 2) The entrance crawl is impassable after heavy rain.

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MEANWHILE ON MENDIP

SWILDONS HOLE

The main talking point is the recent dig which now avoids Sump 6. Non-divers can now do a dry (!) trip to Swildons VII. Sump 7 is only 15ft long but is fairly tight on the far side. Sump 8 can also be bypassed, while Sum 9, the longest in Swildons, is 130 feet.

John Evans paid a visit to Sump 12, before his ear trouble, and tells of extensive blasting going on there.

Our reaction to news of a discovery in the well trodden paths of St. Pauls Series was one of amazement. The find was made by She ton and is believed to be several hundred feet long and extremely tight.
