At the end of last warm sunny and birdsongful summer, our good and much loved and admired friend, Willie Stanton, and his overworked not to mention good looking Reservoir Hole team, had a long cool clear look at the gaping orifice-like dig and were physically, ment ally and in only ten rounds knocked out by its remarkable prospects, but were unhappily amazed by the sheer typical MCG-like hbon endidle mess, of a their cknot effort we had made. For those not familiar with the present state of the dig it is now possible to walk in almost to the end. To ease respoil removal the drainpipe has been blasted and 78 steps built. Progress (at the time of writing, oh so long ago) was continuing, with the roof being blasted and mud removed to the surface using a bucket chain. How to dig UFS

Any number can dig - six people can remove spoil while smaller groups can stack it inside the cave.

But don't eat it

Guantitative analysis of the mud being extracted has shown that it contennated by the content of the mud being extracted has shown at one time from the old lead buddle pits. LEAD IS A CUMULATIVE POISON so elementary precautions should be taken after digging:

- 1. Wash your hands after digging
- 2. Wash your boiler suit after use (lead-rich dust could be inhaled when the mud dries) on but in the mud

This is probably the only Mendip dig where lead is present in this way but there is no danger if the elementary precautions are taken.

## GB LOSES FIXED TACKLE IN ANTI-VANDAL MOVE

TO curb vandalism in GB Cave UBSS are arranging for the fixed tackle to be removed. This includes removal of the chains into the main chamber from the Devil's Elbow route and the fixed ladder to the Ladder Dig series. Entry to the LDS is now more complicated and the first man up should attach two ladders to the three rawlbolts or use etrier steps.

Not now a novices! paradise

Clearly, writes Pete Mathews, the grading of this cave is now much more severe especially when you bear in mind that both routes down are damp - The easy way has an almost permanent duck/sump involving a squeeze and the caver is no longer the easy trip for novices that it was.
