
The witch her fearful power spent will not of evil still repent



- 5 EMPTY EISAN INTO CESSPIT NEAR NEW BUILDING. LIFTERS ARE PROVIDED FOR REMOVAL AND REPIACEMENT OF THE MANHOLE COVER THE EISAN MUST BE EMPTIED WHETHER FULL OR NOT.

  NOTE IT IS BETTER TO EMPTY THE EISAN WHEN IT IS ONLY HAIF FULL DUE TO THE DISTANCE TO THE CESS PIT. IT MUST A LWAYS HE REFILLED USING EISAN FILLID.
