QUARRING BIASTS MAIAYSIA'S UNDERGROUND PAST

Zizuddin Sardar reptrted in the New Scientist recently, that Environmental Groups in Malaysia have launched a nationwide campaignto save the prehistoric Caves at Salayang, four miles north of Kuala Immur, which are threaten ed with callapse through quarry blasting.

Batu Caves is the name of the complete ecosystem which includes
Temple Cave, Dark Cave, Museum Cave, Fallen Cave, Sakai Cave and the Quarry Caves.
It is known that the Quarry Caves have now been completely destroyed and it is
also believed Sakai Cave also. Now the entire complex is threaten by extensive
ouarrying at three sites.

The caves support a large variety of rate plants and at least two which can not be found anywhere else in the world. They are also the habitat for several species of bats, frags, lizards, snakes and other animals. They also have a deep religious significance for the Hinus of Malaysia in the shrine in Temple Cave.

Despite the fact that the Batu Caves were given the status of a National Monument in the Third Malaysian Plan, the quarrying activities that generate 3000 tonnes of limestone and 13 tennes of dust per day now threaten the caves with callapse and destruction. Of the three Quarries operating in the Batu Caves area, the Public Works Department Quarry is located only 400 yds from the Temple Cave. It has been operating since 1973 and produces some 300,000 tonnes of crushed rock every year. The other two quarries — the Dolomite Industries Quarry and the Kenneison Quarry — began their operations in 1954 and 1959 respectively: Dolomite is blasting some 528 yards from the Dark Caves. The two private quarries are reported to pay an annual royalty of £300,000 to the Selanger State Government.

According to Kiew Boon Hang of the Malaysian Nature Society, the our stages that would lead, if unchecked, to the ultimate destruction of the caves. Shock waves from the quarry blasting have resulted in the thinning of roofs it some caves, making them vulnerable to colapse".

In the past few years, groups such as the Malaysian Nature Society, the Batu Caves Protection Association, Sahabat Alam Malaysia (SAM - Friends of the Earth Malaysia) and the Environmental Protection Society, have shown their concern ever the deticrating state of the caves. Farlier this year, SAM initiated a "Save Batu Caves" campaign. It has already sent out several hundred petitions to the federal and state authorities under this compaign, and several people have staged

a fast infront of the caves in a dramatic bid to get the authorities to stop the quarrying activities.

In 1978, the Ministry of Science, Technology and Environment, in a special report to the Selangor Government, warned that blasting at one of the quarries caused seismic disturbance in the cave area, and could endanger the exist ing structure of the caves. Public concern grew in March last year when several scientists reported that frequent rumblings and rockfalls in the caves could lead to a major collapse or landslide. Cracks were also found in the cave walls. At the same time, a geological report to the state government, prepared by the Tourist Development Corporation, recommended that the blasting at Batu caves should halt.

These reports prompted the Selanger government's ennouncement that all quarrying activities would stop by 19th June 80. new ouarry sites were allocated to the companies.

In July the Selangor government gave an extention to activities at the two Batu quarries until 31 December gecause the alternative quarry site at Sungei Long, Kajang, lacks roads and electricity. This caused something of an uproxr in Malaysian environmentalist circles.

The state government gave in alittle to public pressure by ennouncing on 9th September that the two private quarries have been asked to stop blasting immediately in certain areas near the caves. Kenneison Quarry, which has been blasting in sever areas, was asked to limit its blasting to the four areas furthest from the main caves; Dolomite was asked to close one of its three blasting areas.

However, SAM argues that to stop blasting at certain points will not make any great difference to the existing cituation. Even if the blasting stopped at once, SAM argues the risk of a collapse inside the caves still exists, as their structure is already seriously weakend. If there is no dramatic collapse within the next few months the continuing process of weakening caused by shock waves and tremors may still lead to a deepening of cracks, more rock falls and gollapses.

However the Deputy State Secrétary (Chairman of the Governments Data Caves Special Committee) has declared the government will stand firm on its decision whatever the protesters do. SAM declared 12 October 80 a day of protest against quarrying at Batu Caves. 300 environmentalists gathered in front of the caves. The Save Batu Caves Group now plans to intensify its campaign with regular weekly fasts and a regular vigil in parts of the caves.
