# FAILURE REPORT.

## WARNING DANGEROUS KARABINERS

FROM THE N.C.A. EQUIPMENT COMMITTEE

Recently there have been at least 6 failures of <u>SIMOND 10mm oval ALLOY</u> <u>karabiners</u>. These are marked SPELEO 1500 kg on the spine and have a cross type latch, Most failures have been the result of some element of sideways (minor axis) loading, but the most disturbing thing is that a failure has been reported with the correc: loading (i.e. along the major axis end to end). The mode of failure is fracture of the keeper latch allowing the keeper to be pulled through the gate opening. In view of these reports, these karabiners have already been withdrawn from the shops, and it is suggested that they are no longer used.

# CMI HANDLED ASCENDERS : RESPONSE TO COMPLAINTS

Following minor complaints about CMI 5000 Ascender design, and at the request of their U.K. distributors, Troll Safety Equipment, CMI have made several important modifications to this handled ascender. The wrapover section of the ascender body where the cam jams the rope has been lengthened and strengthened so that now on tests so far carried out the rope always breaks before the wrapover failure (at between 700 and 800 kgf depending on the type of rope): the cam has been redesigned to give better grip and made lighter: the spring has been strengthened and modified so that all the problems outlined in issue 11 of 'Caves and Caving' have been overcome. The extruded alloy body which has the great advantage of reliab ility over a cast body (cast bodies can crack with impact) remains the same.

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This modified ascender will be available from September onwards only from Troll Safety Equipment who are the Official Distributors, through their appionted retailers, and will be marked as sich. The reason for this is that there have been in the past, and may well be again, 'grey' imports, that is not imported through Troll, which which may not have the modifications pioneered by Troll and for which they cannot of course be held responsible.

Because Troll are very keen on customer satisfaction, replacement modified spring and cam assemblies (which overcome the precious problems) are now being made available <u>free of charge</u> for CMI 50() (first generation) ascenders, where users have been experiencing problems.

This offer only applies to those CMI 5000 ascenders imported by Troll which can be recognised by the following points:-

- 1 Body is grey/black in colour
- 2 Cam hinge pin rotates when cam is depressed or released.
- 3 Wrapover section of body (at cam) measures approx. 38mm in length (not 48 mm)

Any other CMI ascenders which do not fit this description can be regarded as 'grey imports'.

Ascenders qualifying for replacement spring and cam assemblies may either be returned direct to Troll Safety Equipment, Spring Mill, Uppermill, Nr. Oldham OL3 6AA or through the shop where the ascender was purchased.

#### A TRIP TO UBLEY HILL POT

Better late than never said the editor. So, some six weeks later I find myself writing a description of what happened on the morning of the A.G.M. Malcolm Cotter and myself had desided to take Ian McKechnie and Mick Lowe, both Probationary Members on a Training Trip. What a tragedy we thought. Four desperately keen cavers with no cave to explore. Reluctantly we turned around, and dejected, started our long journey back to the cottage and the beer.

'You could go down Gow Hole instead though - theres no lambs in that field." 'Bollocks' 'No, theres no bullocks either' 'But Cow Hole is closed, Mendip Underground says so' 'Its open now. Someome came along and did a bit off digging'. 'Sods' 'No, boulders mostly'.

Fifteen minutes later I was 20 feet underground in Cow Hole face to face with a 2foot high boulder held up by air and a bit of mud. Malcolm decided to move it aside. After a bat more gardening Ian and Mick rigged the pitch and descended, clearing a few more stones on the way. As the boulder chamber at the top of the pitch was a bit loose, and lack of space on the first 10 feet of the pitch made a double line difficult. I stayed behind to lifeline (well, someone had to do it, and 20 feet of caving on the day of the A.G.M. sounded quite reasonable to me). Then Ian came up and offered to lifeline me down. Despite my protests (A.G.M. started, beer to drink etc.) her insisted I should go.

'This is a Training Trip. I have to demonstrate I'm capable of lifelining he said.

So I joined Malcolm at the bottom of the cave, having a bit of fear on two awkward climbs on theway (a short line would have been useful).

By the time we got out, got back and changed, I was tired and the A.G.M. had started. And this is where we come to the real purpose of this article; Some of you may remember a body in red jeans at the Dinner, It was me! You see, I wasn't drunk, just tired. I was asleep, after a hard day's caving.

P.S. On a more serious note, I have since been back to Cow Hole to tidy up a few more boulders at the top of the pitch. The ruckle is still unstable but can be passed with care. Belay points are hard to find, perhaps someone could put in a bolt? Anyway, its a good little cave and all M.C.G. Members should visit it while open. Call at Ubley Hill Farm for permission.
