MORE MINUTES PER PINT

Once again the infertile minds at the Department of Transport's South Western Region offices have taken out their felt-tip pens and drawn thick black lines all over the countryside. No, this is not the new Government's way of accelerating the road programme, but it does represent a second public stage of the Heytesbury Bypass, to follow on immediately after the Warminster bypass which these pages have mentioned previously.

Heytesbury, as all MCG members who travel via the A303 route will know, is the first sign of habitation reached on the A36 after zooming across Salisbury Plain at unmentionable speeds. It has a 30 mph limit, regarded more in the breach than the observance. The village appears tatty, and could be spruced up considerably if the through traffic were removed (including Mendip cavers).

Unfortunately it isn't easy to bypass the village. A route to the south of the village was rejected at public consultation because of the impact on the Wylye Valley (an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) and its effect on the next village along, Knook. Perhaps more important to the Department, it would cost more than the alternative to the north of Heytesbury, which route has now been selected (on a shortened alignment). The proposed line passes near to housing north of the present road, and severs Heytesbury House from its grounds!

To the motorist, the bypass would begin at the road junction of the A36 and the route from Chitterne, and would continue on an easy alignment to feed directly into the eastern end of the proposed Warminster bypass. So cutting another minute or two from the London-Hunters timing. Meanwhile, spare a thought for the suffering residents of Heytesbury next time you drive through - some will be inconvenienced as much by a bypass. Subject to approval under the statutory procedures, and funding, construction of the bypass could start in 2 to 3 years' time and take up to 2 years to complete.
