Bone Hole. Saturday 31 August. Neil H, Pat and David W.
All spoil from previous trips stacked in side chamber and about 15 bucket loads and two large boulders removed from face. PS. Face still quite wet. NH

Bone Hole. Sunday 1 Sept. Neil, John, Geoff. A number of large boulders removed. Dig is now bending back under the very large boulder into an alcove on the right and straight down. Still very wet and muddy. Two large boulders need breaking into smaller lumps - chemicals required. NH.

Upper Flood, Sunday 1 September. Alan Dougherty, Victoria Arbizu and Yvonne Ward. Weather - showers. Digging, 18 skips removed. Social visit from Alan Mellon et al. Stream low. 5 hours. APD.

Wigmore Swallet/Wigmore Mine Shaft. Sunday 1 Sept. An inspection of this sporadically dug swallet revealed a 25 ft entrance pitch with a low connection with a loose roof! A descent through a dug out rift led to a long dog-leg crawl to a too tight (for me!) wet, flat-out double squeeze. I was told there was approx 80ft of passage to the dig face beyond. Total cave length approx 300ft. The shafts inspected were approx 25-30ft deep and were supposedly vent shafts for an old lead mine. Dirty, smelly and very loose material at the bottom. John B.

Nordrach Mine. Saturday 7 Sept. C Richards, Alan Dougherty. Visit to this mine in the groove on the other side of the road from Pine Tree Pot, to take photos and notes. Entrance shaft, rectangular, in worked out vein. Entrance series in same vein. Runs NW/SE. Sockets in each wall mear North end for a pulley bar above shaft (blocked after 6ft. The next shaft through solid rock, threatened by a large precariously perched boulder in a chimney in the roof, goes down 30 ft. AV 25ft. The miners drove Northwestwards (in the same vein) finding a 4ft increase in the width of the vein. Approx 20ft, going NW through a small chamber with a chimney, going on for 12ft to a chamber of new rocks. All this lower part of the mine is an old seraled (?) (Editor despairs of handwriting!) infilled with mud & pebbles. Tackle required: 80ft ladder all joined together, tether at top of entrance shaft to old agricultural machinery which cavers entrance, * (short tether), lifelines 80ft and 90ft. Chris Richards.

Eastwood Manor Mines 1 & 11. Tuesday

A more determined look and armed with
some digging tools to create a safer
entrance crawl were rewarded with some
200ft of passage of mainly stooping
height.

EMMI is entered by a 5ft wide slot in the left bank of the 'quarry' and is one single passage basically totalling about 50ft. Evidence of human activity is confirmed by odds'n'ends near the entrance.

EMMII is more of a mystery. Entered by a low entrance crawl in the south bank, passes numerous spiders' nests in the roof and a badger's lair on the left dropping into passage at height of 5ft and going off in a southerly and easterly direction. The wall and roof material is very friable and should be treated with extreme caution.

One bat (ah!) was seen in the further reaches together with animal remains.

Alan has taken samples to analyse and plans a further scientific visit (& survey?). John B.


Little Neath River Cave. Saturday 28 Sept. Domestic circumstances ...

Ubley Hill Pot. 6 October. Ian McK and Yvonne W.

The entrance shaft (concrete pipes) is now almost submerged in slipped mud! If it gets any worse, we may need to put in another section.

The cave is as muddy as ever. At the foot of the second pitch were a lot of loose bones - some could be human size and looked very old.

At the end of the cave, there was a strong solvent-like smell, similar to wetsuit adhesive. Has someone been dumping chemicals near which have percolated through into the cave?

Fortunately, it was raining hard on the walk back, which washed some of the mud off. lan.

<u>Fairy Cave.</u> 6 October. Jo Davies, Linda Gates, Joan Goddard, Arthur Spain, Pat Walsh, David Walsh. At the boulder ruckle at the entrance it was guite tricky to find the way on. It is important to remember to climb up and to the right. A very squeezy crawly cave with some lovely formations. The level of the water in the duck was lower than it had been previously and it was possible to get through without washing your ears. Further flat out crawls and squeezes eventually led to the 'fairy grotto' and the general consensus was that the discomfort was worth it. We sat in the grotto for refreshments and Linda peeled off her wetsuit to reveal a chocolate sodden T-shirt. Would anyone like a lick of my bounty bar? she said! As we entered the cave a blue sky gave the old feeling 'Oh, why am I going underground with weather like this?' Once the light of day was lost around the first corner, blue skies were forgotten and a passage led us on. The water level was very low and Malcolm remarked that he had not seen it so low all year. Digging began, and apart from removing two rather large, stubborn boulders it all went fairly easily. The spoil mainly consisted of mud mixed with calcite. Our main problem was that the shovel should have been a spade. The length of handle made it hard, almost impossible, to use.Filling the skip was easier just using our hands. After about 15 hours and 15 skip loads I think we made about 3ft of progress into the tunnel. On the way out, Malcolm and I stayed behind while Denise left the cave. We spent about another hour taking photographs. Our attempts on the way down had been ruined because the flash had become damp and refused to work. CUT PRICE caving (and other) Gear

Ever heard of Culverhouse, 96 The Parade, Watford, Herts?
No, I hadn't either until their contract and mail order price list landed on the doormat. Apart from caving equipment, they cater for walking, climbing, canoeing, backpacking, camping and survival gear.

The Culverhouse 48-page price list offers a good selection from almost all the brand leaders - well-known suppliers in the caving gear section are Troll, Petzl, Blue Water, Premier, Speleo Technics, Jumar. Price reductions are quite considerable judging by the brief selection of gear shown compared with current Caving Supplies' prices, VAT inc:

Troll PVC oversuit, £26.91 (£31.90 from Caving Supplies).

Wetsuit, 4mm two-piece, £46.81 (£57.75 from CS).

Premier carbide caplamp, £8.34 (£9.35 from CS).

Carbide, 1 kg, £2.05 (£2.35, CS).

Petzl Croll chest ascender, £13.25 (£14.95, CS).

Ladder, 25ft, 10in spacing, 3mm wire, £26.44 (£30.65, CS).

Bluewater 2 rope, per metre, £1 (£1.33, CS).

Viking 10mm rope, per metre, £0.72 (£0.81, CS)

Ammo box, 12inx6inx3in, £2.30 (£2.85 from Caving Supplies).

Culverhouse claim to probably hold '...the largest stock of outdoor pursuits equipment you are likely to see under one roof.' Their contract prices are cheaper than their retail prices, and are available to bona fide organisations such as MCG. All orders can be collected (saving postage) from Watford, giving at least 24 hours notice of order. Their shop is in Watford lown Centre and is open Monday to Saturday, 9am-5.30pm. SOUTH WALES CAVES

MCG GETS PERMIT

Tony Knibbs reports

By arrangement with South Wales Caving Club and the local Nature Conservancy Council, the Group has been granted an annual permit for visits to OFDII and III via Top Entrance and Cwmdwr Quarry Cave. The permit also allows access to Pwll Paut Mawr and Tunnel Cave/Cathedral Cave via the Tunnel Cave Top Entrance.

The permit is permanently lodged in the Duty Officer's cupboard at SWCC's Penwyllt HQ where a key may be obtained for OFD Top Entrance and Cwmdwr Quarry Cave. Tunnel Cave Top entrance will eventually be locked but Paut Mawr requires no key.

Unless you are known by the Duty Officer, he or she may ask for some means of personal and club identification, so make sure you take your MCG Membership Card.

Because our annual permit cannot easily be examined in advance of the visit, the access rules which appear on the reverse of the form are set out below. Visitors enter the Nature Reserves and caves entirely at their own risk and subject to the following conditions of access:

- 1. Unless SWCC HQ is closed (when other arrangements must be made) a keyticket must be completed with the name of each person entering the cave. The destination board must be used. Parties are required to leave the cave by 5pm on Sundays.
- 2. This permit is for entry only. Camping, digging and the use of explosives, dyes and traces and other

research projects require special permission.

- 3. The gates are to be kept locked at all times.
- 4. Marker tapes must not be crossed or moved under any circumstances.
- 5. No litter whatsoever is to be left either in or outside the cave.
- 6. All lighting must beelectric. Carbide must not be taken into the cave.
- 7. Installations, apparatus and equipment must not be damaged.
- 8. The leader is responsible for the conduct, safety and equipment of his party, which shall not exceed 7 persons, including himself.
- 9. This permit also allows access to the land surface within the nature reserve. This land is subject to a full agricultural tenancy and visitors must respect the farming activities taking place.
- 10. Failure to observe these conditions may result in any future application being refused.

IN THE EVENT OF EMERGENCY CONTACT SWCC HQ OR DIAL 999 AND ASK FOR CAVE RESCUE.

Ogof Ffynnon Ddu II Streamway: NB

- a. Cavers are advised to wear wetsuits in this streamway.
- b. It is recommended that novices should not be taken into the OFD II Streamway.

London under London, Richard Trench and Ellis Hillman, London 1985. An entertaining dabble into the history of tunnels under London. Covers sewers, piped streams, underground railways, defence, the London Hydraulic Power Company, and more. Pleasant bedtime reading.

Dictionaries (French, German, Spanish, etc). We have in the library an assortment of dictionaries to assist your translation from French, German, Spanish, etc. If you need assistance with translation from any language, please contact the hon Recorder, who is not a polyglot, but may be able to suggest someone who is!

Several people stressed that SRT isn't odd or bizarre. General opinion - club should buy one SRT rope for training. Also. Roy should buy more tackle sacks to protect all ropes. Alan stressed that lifeline rope is just as vital as SRT rope to your safety. 8. Money - Mike says club funds are OK. Banker's order idea for subs thrown out because we'd need a bond. NB covenants are important to us, hence April 1 deadline for subs. 9. Meets - Geoff appealed for ideas for 1986 meets. 10. Armchair meets - Steve appealed for ideas & offers.
