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MINUTES OF THE 1987 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE MENDIP CAVING GROUP

Held at Nordrach Cottage, Charterhouse-on-Mendip at 3pm on Saturday 4th April 1987.

Honorary Chairman - Tony Knibbs.

M. Rowe, on a point of order asked whether full members were allowed to vote at the AGM if subscriptions have not been paid. The feeling of the meeting was that this point should not be pursued at this time.

- 1. Apologies for absence were received from Victoria Arbizu and Mike Haselden.
- Minutes of the 1986 AGM were published in the October 1986 Newsletter, and were taken as read. There were no comments arising.
- 3. Officer's reports
- 3.1 Treasurer's report. The Treasurers report was distributed and taken as read. M. Cotter proposed a vote of thanks for the Auditors.
- 3.2 Cottage Warden's report. B. Pittman asked whether low-level heaters should be fitted in the changing room. Several members pointed out that cottage cleaning and cottage work is now very lax. P. Ingold suggested that work weekends should be organised. The Chairman proposed that members should organise this. R. Kempston asked whether any of the organisations using the cottage midweek are profit making organisations. The Cottage Warden stated that one is, running outward bound courses. A. Dougherty raised this as a moral point:- are we encouraging over use of caves? M. Cotter asked whether mid week bookings will prevent mid week use by members. The Cottage Warden stated that occupancy is never greater than 60% on any weekend.
- 3.3 Editor's report. The Editor's report was distributed and taken as read. P. Ingold proposed a vote of thanks for regular newsletters, and this was received with acclaimation by the floor.
- 3.4 Recorder's report. Good use has been made of the library and we have added around 120 items during the year. J. Roberts has provided a word processor on "permanent loan". This is being used to produce a Journal and will in due course reside in the library.
- 3.5 Meet Secretary's report. The Meet Secretary put forward the meet list in the membership card as his report. J. Miriam asked whether the Meet Secretary is responsible for booking accommodation on away meets. The Meet Secretary stated that due to the variable qualities of meet leaders and meet secretaries, it is unwise to expect perfection. It was agreed that this meant "yes".
- 3.6 Tackle Master's report. The Tackle Master's report was distributed and taken as read. The point was raised that tackle has been misused, e.g. unwashed ropes not correctly coiled, ladders dirty and thrown on the tackle store floor, badly kinked belays etc. P. Ingold suggested that cleaning, coiling etc. should be included on the proving trip form. It appears this is just laziness. J. Miriam pointed out that other clubs e.g. SWCC, NPC lock up tackle and only allow access through committee members. It was agreed after considerable discussion that the situation on the lamps / helmets held in the tackle store should be reviewed, to ensure that they were adequate.
- 3.7 Secretary's report. The Secretary's report was distributed and taken as read. B. Terry asked whether there is a ceiling or seatership. After some discussion, it was agreed that there should be no ceiling until facilities are shown to be inadequate.3.8 Ordinary Member's report. It was asked whether sweat-shirts and T-shirts could be available at the cottage, probably as part of the shop. J. Goddard asked whether more armchair meets could be organised, and this was endorsed by most members present.
- Election of Officers. Secretary: N. Hutchinson proposed by R. Kempston, seconded by D. Samuel. *ret Secretary: Election between M. Rowe and G. Barton. G. Barton was elected by secret ballot. Other posts: No nominations, and existing members returned unopposed.
- Electric of Auditors, B. Terry, P. Spain were prepared to stand again as Auditors for the Group account, and were
 proposed by the meeting.

5. Amendments to Constitution and Rules.

- 5.1 Wend paragraph 10(e) from "...signing cheques in excess of £10" to "...signing cheques in excess of £200". Accepted unanimously on a show of hands.
- 5.2 Delete parts 2, 3 and 4 and replace with the following:-

"Part 2: Caving. The group recommends that all members read and act in accordance with the National Caving Code as published by the National Caving Association". J. Roberts raised the question of whether club rules should be mandatory or advisory. M. Cotter proposed that the current NCA rules be incorporated in the Constitution and Rules. J. Cursi pointed out that the insurance covers the group even if the group is neglegent. I. McKechnie pointed out the implications of this, namely that the more strict the rules, the more likely that an individual would be found liable in the event of an accident. The amendment was accepted by 25 to 0.

 Date and venue of next meeting. The group agreed that the next AGM would be held at 3pm on Saturday 26th March 1988 at Nordrach Cottage.

There was no other business.

TACKLEMASTER'S REPORT

An up to date list of tackle held will be given to the meeting. Virtually all of the wire belays had to be replaced during the year because of damage caused by improper use. The standard of tackle care appears to have improved during the year, but is still not good enough. A cursory inspection of the tackle store will indicate to any member the need to improve on this point. Some ropes have not been washed and coiled properly, and on numerous occasions ropes are booked out without tackle sacks to carry them underground.

Appended to the report is an analysis of tackle bookings since the new ropes were installed in 1986. Unfortunately it is rather flawed in that individual items were not always identified, because the booking system was not properly followed in all cases.

During the year the following items have been purchased:

15x Wire belays 1x Spot light and charger (aven inspection) 1x Lump hasmer and chisel 4x Verticale helmets 1x FX2 x5 charging rack

A new drag sheet, chest harness and other items have been ordered for the rescue kit. All of the work proposed in last years report is complete or under progress. It is not my intention to stand for re-election. A change is in order and capable hands are waiting!

Many thanks to all those members who have assisted with tackle matters over the last two years.

MEET SECRETARY'S REPORT

Once again you have a full meet programme included with your membership cards. The aim has been to provide you with one Hendip and one "Away" meet each month, with a variety of trips to suit all abilities.

One additional item I would like to introduce, made possible by our healthy income, is a grant from the group to support trips away from Mendip which will enable greater numbers to participate in the more exotic trips. I will suggest a sum of £400 per annum to be used at the discretion of the Meet Secretary.

Finally, one disappointment - it has not been possible to obtain a booking for Peak Cavern in October although a trip to Derbyshire remains on, and one addition - Otter Hole is booked for Saturday 28th May.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING 31-12-87 by Mike Lovell

It has been a year of record income due mainly to midweek bookings by the Navy (£832) and Unicorn Leisure (£2343) and partly due to a 50% increase in members' usage. Discounting the income from midweek bookings, the cottage income from members, their guests and guest clubs (£2135) barely covered running costs (£2166 after deduction of a prepayment of £185 for 1988 electricity). The midweek booking income has allowed us to carry out much needed cottage maintenance and improvement without digging too deeply into our funds.

The normal loss on the Dinner was restricted to £1 and the Half Yearly barn dance made a profit of £39. Members subscriptions (£1582.50) adequately covered the general running costs of the group (£1332), due to a reduction in printing costs and tackle expenditure. Other income from shirt sales and bank interest produced an increase of £169 in our overall funds after allowing for outstanding floats.

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SECRETARY'S REPORT

Firstly, let we apologise for being unable to attend the shouting match (sorry, ABM). I hope to make it for the evening bash so any abuse due to be hurled in my direction must wait until then.

The last year has seen a slight increase in membership, and a further shift towards a more Mendip-based group. During 87/88 16 new probationary members were accepted (11 from Mendip). We have also gained one associate member, and three probationary members have become full members. Thus, the membership at 1-3-88 stands at: 2 honorary, 83 full, 3 associate and 34 probationary. Total: 122.

87/88 was a rather peculiar year, with the cottage receiving greatly increased use from midweek bookings. As predicted this was a "one-off" situation and bookings in general are now falling back to the levels of previous years. The extra revenue brought in over the year has largely gone towards funding essential maintenance and improvements to the cottage, much of which has been carried out by contractors. Many of you will, I'm sure, disagree with this and argue that previously cottage work has always been carried out by the members. This is very true and all I can say to this is "where was everyone when the work needed doing?" We may not be able to afford the luxury of having cottage work done for us in the coming year so now is the time to start volunteering.

The general caving situation is looking fairly healthy with increased activity on Mendip due mainly to the enlarged Mendip-based section of the group. Away trips, particularly Yorkshire, are becoming more frequent but are still only attended by a small percentage of the active membership. Hopefully we will see more interest in away meets by the new Mendip members over the coming year. The foreign caving scene is also looking very encouraging with another two expeditions planned for the coming year - Majorca at Christmas and Sima GESM in August. It should be noted that in technical difficulty the Sima GESM ranks considerably higher than the Gouffre Berger so this trip should put the group "on the map" in a national sense. With a gradually increasing membership and a diverse meets programme I see the group going from strength to strength in the coming year.

COTTAGE WARDEN'S REPORT

Guite an eventful year it's been. With some increased income I've been able to get some major items sorted out but that situation has changed. Here is a summary of the "goings on".

(a) COTTAGE BOOKINGS.

Member's weekends. On average it's quiet, in fact one weekend of the two member's weekends per month is still not used, leaving the cottage totally unoccupied.

Other weekends. Still used quite frequently although it is still rare that the cottage is packed solid. Our reputation for a high standard of accommodation is spreading as we are attracting a few more "vague" clubs. Still no major clubs outside of Mendip use our facility so the publication and circulation of the long overdue "cottage prospectus" will help our cause.

<u>Midweek bookings.</u> From November '87 this has quietened dramatically. If my records are correct the cheques I have passed to Mike up to Feb '88 are: Royal Navy £519.60, Unicorn Leisure £1963.50. Unicorn now have their own place and it is unlikely that they will have the need to use us again. On the other hand, the Navy will continue but our income will be greatly reduced. The Army are also interested, so who knows? Bearing this in mind, members should check the availability of the cottage before planning a quiet week in the country.

<u>General bookings.</u> With the deposit system introduced 18 months ago, last year saw no "no-shows", no double bookings and I think all clubs had keys to get in. However, there are two members of the group who are not following the booking procedure. I would remind people that booking via 'phone or letter (to me) is mandatory for groups or members bringing groups on weekends other than member's weekends. A group is defined as a party larger than one member and his/her two allowable guests. Remember, you may turn up to find beds given to those who have followed the correct procedure.

(b) COTTAGE BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE

Considering the total membership of the group there aren't many who do much to help in this field. Just a few same old faces. On a "work weekend" (huh!) last year you could count the attenders on one hand (Mickey Mouse's hand at that). People moan about work not getting done but don't really help out except with words, so we have to pay for it. Work that has been done has been published in the newsletter and is roughly costed in this document. Our building won't stay up for ever without attention and we are always seeking to improve the facilities. So next time there is a working weekend - be there. I would like, however, to offer my thanks to those people who have rodded the drains, polished the toilets, re-sited the rope washer or washed the teatowels. And kept quiet about broken windows.



CHARTERHOUSE CAVES, ACCESS ARRANGEMENTS

Full members of the MCG automatically receive a five year permit for access to caves on the land owned by Bristol Waterworks Company. If you do not have a current permit, you should collect yours from the library next time you visit the cottage. The permit is only valid for the holder. If you take a guest to a BWC cave, you must first of all issue him/her with a temporary 15 day permit available from the lecturn. The following article explains the workings of the Charterhouse Caving Committee who issue the permits, and first appeared in WCC Journals 191 and 193. It is printed here with minor amendments.

The area covered by the Charterhouse Caving Committee (CCC) agreement covers the Bristol Waterworks Company land at Charterhouse, around GB Cavern, and part of Cheddar Gorge. The caves included are:

GB CAVERN	LONGHOOD AUGUST	RHINO RIFT
CHARTERHOUSE CAVE	RESERVOIR HOLE	TYNINGS FARM SWALLET
as well as various (minor caves and digs.	

The CCC consists of the major Mendip caving clubs including MCG, each having one vote and entitled to hold cave keys for their own use or to issue to visitors. CCC and member clubs are required to hold third party insurance indemnifying BWC. All cavers entering BWC land are required to hold a current CCC permit to prove indemnity.None of the CCC caves are suitable for novices, and no-one under 16 may enter the caves. Digs (above or below ground) must be approved by the CCC committee and a progress report made to the AGM of the CCC committee. Failure to do so could result in the committee assuming a site to be abandoned. BWC require gates to be locked at all times, including when a party is underground.

Access to GB is controlled by UBSS on a sub-licence from CCC and different access rules apply:

Each caver must carry a valid CCC permit. Party size limited to six including the leader. Nobody under the age of sixteen. No novices. Minors must have an indemnity chit signed by a parent. No carbide. No digging or photography without prior permission of UBSS. Cave to be locked at all times. Observe the caving code.

Access to Charterhouse Cave is covered by similar restrictions with the additional rule that party size is limited to four and groups must be led by an approved leader (for the MCG - J. Beauchamp or Y. Ward). The access arrangements for Upper Flood are simple by comparison!

MENDIP CAVING GROUP CONSTITUTION

Observant readers of newsletter no. 197 which contained the Constitution and Rules have noticed a few anomallies (example: there is a Part 1 but no Part 2).

No, these are not typing errors. The Constitution and Rules were ammended at the AGM and unfortunately a few short-comings (such as references to rules which no longer exist) went unnoticed.

However, it is possible to correct an ommission caused by lack of space last month by publishing the National Caving Code of the National Caving Association.

The group recommends that all members read this, and act in accordance.

NATIONAL CAVING ASSOCIATION - The National Caving Code

SAFETY- A PLAN TO BE SAFE

- A lways include experienced cavers in the party.
- P ick a cave or pothole within everyone's capabilities.
- L eave a note of your trip and latest time of return with a responsible person and report to them on your return.
- A sk for, and act on, local advice. N o less than four in the party and keep together.
- T ake notice of the local weather forecast.
- *O* ne reliable cap-lamp for each person. Without light, you're lost.
- **B** oots , helmet and warm clothing are essential.
- E mergency lights, food and first aid kit should always be taken.
- S ee that ladders, belays and ropes are inspected and rigged properly before hanging your life on them.
- underground A ccident is always easy: rescue is sometimes difficult, some- times impossible.
- F alls, loose boulders, rising water and exposure cause most accidents.
- E xit takes more effort than entry. Plan with the return in mind.

CONSERVATION

- C lumsiness can wreck cave formations.
- O bserve marked routes they are there to safeguard the cave.
- N ever leave litter or spent carbide in a cave - polution kills cave life.
- S et others a good example when caving - persuade them to follow it.
- E nlist the help of the Regional Caving Council in passing on scientific information to be recorded nationally.
- R esponsible leaders will avoid taking novices where they may accidentally cause damage.
- ✓ andalism means damage to stals, mud floors, rimstone pools, etc. - help prevent it.
- A lert your Regional Caving Council to any developments which may possibly damage caves.
- remains which may be of archaeological interest.
- I nvite help in taping off formations to keep caves in their undamaged state for the generations to follow us.
- **O** rganise a trip to clear up litter now and again.
- N ature needs YOUR help to safeguard her interests NOW!
