The PINTS committee was composed of Jon Roberts, Roger Wallington, John and Helen Miriam, Mike Lovell, Ian Mckechnie, Geoff Barton, Roy Kempston, Dik Housego and Bernard Reeves under the chairmanship of Bryan Pittman.


The Eclipse is on the A30 at the roundabout where Egham Hill and Egham High Street meet. Courage Best and Directors (good body) are available. There is a sub-division of the bar which is capable of being closed off at no extra cost; it accommodates up to 30 people. Those present found themselves in charge of this area, giving a snug atmosphere while the landlord and his staff were pleasant to their customers. The only drawback is that on the last Thursday of the month another society uses the room early on, and it may not be available for our use. The Eclipse has a further advantage: it adjoins Windsor Great Park, where a number of MCG members go for early Thursday evening fitness runs (contact Mike Lovell or Roger Wallington for details). It was generally felt that nothing as suitable for our requirements had been seen before. Based on PINTS recommendation, the new MCG London area Thursday venue is now the Eclipse Inn. We look forward to seeing as many members as possible at the new venue. There is even a rumour that the MCG will be re-named the M25CG.

Change is always rather disruptive, but it is clear that the usefulness of the Mawson Arms to the Group had run out. Indeed the low attendance there was holding the Group back from new exploits organised on the spur of a few Thursday beers.

Many members will have much quicker journeys than to and from the Mawson Arms, while, because of the fast roads, even those from West London may find the journey no slower

despite the longer distance. Motorists will find the pub about 1 mile west of though the junction M25, arrangements for leaving the M25 are rather convoluted - watch for the A30 and Egham signs! For the non-driving drinker the Eclipse is only 7 minutes walk from Egham station, which has fast trains to Waterloo (33 mins) every half hour, including an apres-pub express at 11.39pm calling at principal stations to London. Other late evening trains run to (11.15pm), Camberley Meybridge (11.46pm), and Earley and Frimley Reading (11.03pm and 12.09pm). FOUR MEN AND A WOMAN HAVE FUN IN GB CAVERN

AD: It was with some doubt about our ability to carry out the practice that Nicola Caswell, John Crowsley, Alan Dougherty, Vince Simmonds and Richard Whittington entered 6B Cavern at 11.30am, Saturday 04.03.89. Unusually mild weather for our practice rescue was dampened by a poor turnout. Were we taking the 6B maximum party size to heart or had the MCG developed a collective taste for watching rugby internationals? We made our way to the pitch at the end of the Main Chamber. The pitch was rigged for a haul and the victim was tied into the drag sheet in a dry alcove, to the left of the stream flowing towards the terminal choke. In lacing up the drag sheet we found that a length of tape provided a comfortable method of holding the portion of sheet about the upper torso together.

HC: I was placed in an oversized furry suit and a PVC suit, given a pair of goggles to protect my face then tied very firmly into a drag sheet. The rescue team checked to make sure I was comfortable before proceeding to lift me.

AD: By 1.50pm the victim had been hauled up the pitch. Some difficulty was experienced with friction at the top of the pitch. No obvious high belays were found amongst the shattered rock above the pitch head and the haul rope tended to catch behind small flakes on the climb. A length of conveyor belting or similar at the head of the climb would have aleviated most of the problem. We hauled up the true left of the stream but there was a tendency for the drag sheet to swing towards the water. Given sufficient rescuers, a rope from the foot of the drag sheet would have solved the problem. JC and RW pulled the haul rope via a pulley / jammer system, AD lifelined to the victim's sit harness and VS climbed with the drag sheet protected by a safety-link. Sufficient linked belays were found amongst the boulders at the head of the pitch.

KC: Several stops wre made on the way out during which the rescue team constantly checked I was comfortable, although the only discomfort I suffered was very cold hands and feet, and from the goggles which tended to move around and eventually fell apart.

AD: Coffee and warm air were enjoyed at the top of the climb. Although the quietest victim we have had in recently, Nicola did have a great taste for coffee and warm air.

NC: Half way out I was given a face mask which issued warm air for me to breath in, it helped a bit but I don't think I was ever cold enough to get the full benefit of it.

AD: We were impressed by the workings of the warm air kit lent by MRO. A temperature of 38deg C was obtained according to the guage in the face mask. The kit, which packs into a large ammo box, comprises a face mask and delivery tube, CO2 cylinder and cannister of soda lime. CO2 is added to the soda lime and the chemical reaction is used to warm the air. It is important to blow the initial build up of CO2 from the system before offering the victim the mask. A max. temp. must not be exceeded but this is apparently unlikely in a British cave. So popular was the warm air that that speculation abounded as to the constitution of the white powder within the cannister! By 2.00pm we reached the bottom of the small climb at the top of the Gorge. This proved awkward and a stemple would have been useful to provide a high belay - the rock above the climb was rather rotten. We proceeded by carrying the victim for a distance and then returning for spare kit. The Mud Passage proved fairly straightforward. At the climb to the blockhouse, seperate haul and lifelines were arranged. One of the party acted as a counter balance on the haul rope, a system which worked well.

HC: Throughout, I was relatively comfortable and felt very confident in the rescue team and the equipment they used, although better goggles and something to keep my feet warm would have been preferable.

AD: The cave was cleared at 3.40pm, a creditable effort give the size of the party. Thanks are extended to those who took part, especially Nicola as victim and MRO for the loan of kit.



UPPER FLOOD

29.03.89 Recent dig site abandoned due to uninspiring nature. Work re-commenced at boulder ruckle in Andrew's Grotto. 09.04.89 The split rock crew - nuff said!

19.04.89 More spoil shifted. Split Rock Canyon too tight - bang needed.

CHARTERHOUSE AREA

08.02.89 Looked at Rift Mine, "Halfpenny Dig" and un-named shaft.

RODS POT

15.02.89 Dig site blocked by wet mud and stones from connection with surface. Evening spent clearing collapse. Main chamber nearly full — where do we put the spoil? Engineering needeed to protect diggers from rockfall.

29.03.89 Slurry cleared from PJ1(B). Prodding the roof brought a load down! Large boulder removed in PJ1(A), now needs a bang.

NORDRACH

24.03.89 Breakthrough! Dug out large chamber close to cottage for new soakaway.

BLACKMOOR SHAFT

22.03.89 Thoughts about re-opening the dig. A lot of shoring would be required.

BATTERY SWALLET

05.04.89 Now contains a dead rabbit

VOSS PIT

05.04.89 Another summer dig!

BONE HOLE

19.02.89 Pool at dig, no air current.

The following comments appeared in the log book some time ago: "The first impression on entering the cave after 2 years absence was the significant deterioration in the condition of the Upper Series. It appears that regular digging parties have produced the unfortunate side effects of baddly muddied formations and some erosion of skull slope.

Examined the old JM/NH dig which appears to have been left untouched for some time. The new dig at the top of terminal chamber "goes" horizontally. Examination of the survey (MCG Journal '76) shows this new dig is leading for the cliff face 30ft above the road — an outcrop is visible on the surface at this point. The survey suggests JM/NH dig is about or below road level.

It appears the way ahead should be to proceed with JM/NH dig, produce an accurate survey and take care in conservation of the upper series in accordance with the National Trust access agreement. I hope the diggers, who are putting in a lot of valuable work, take these comments as they are intended and will not take offence at an "outsiders" oppinions.

Ed: Perhaps the time has come to construct a "catwalk" above the archaeological deposits in the cave to ensure their continued preservation?

ROCK DRILL

The Group recently purchased a Bosch GBH 24v RE battery powered drill for drilling anchor and shot holes. It runs on a 24-volt re-chargable battery which can be charged in two hours. Its performance is impressive when drilling and fixing bolts. In fact, a 12mm hole can be drilled and an anchor fitted in less then a minute. This means that pitches and climbs can be bolted in a fraction of the time it took by hand. In addition to 12mm anchor holes, it can be used for 18mm shot holes for more effective and efficient use of bang. Because of its value, the drill is locked away. Anyone wanting to use it should contact Steve Redwood.

TO THE RESTAURANT AT THE END OF THE UNIVERSE (AND BACK AGAIN)

SOMETIME IN DECEMBER 1988

Dave says to Dave, "\$?!\$ing hell". This universal caving term was immediately understood to mean "Let's get out of here before the pubs close". We were part way through the sand ducks in the Hard Rock extensions of Daren Cilau. Our conclusion from this little foray into the further reaches of the system: you most definately need to camp to get to the bitter end of the cave.

FRIDAY 17TH MARCH 1989, VERY EARLY MORNING

We assembled a ridiculously big pile of gear to take into the cave with us. At about 10am we were packed and ready to go. I grovelled into the low entrance armed with a tackle sack containing two BDH tubes and a carbide generator (it seemed like a good idea to put the 'bide in the sack and use a Petzl zoom instead). The generator managed to manifest itself into an awkward lump on one side of the sack which jammed on any and every obstruction (and there are thousands of them in the entrance crawl). The other problem with this approach of carrying the generator rather than using it was that the water seeped down the outlet pipe and onto the carbide, filling the passage with acetylene gas (it is quite easy to fill the passage with gas as most of the time it is a very small passage). Through the wet calcite squeezes, only about 5 minutes to the end of the crawl now. After about an hour of thrutching, the entrance series eventually gives way to a chamber and a welcome opportunity to stand up. Now for the ritual of coaxing a flame from the carbide lamp; click, click, click - BOOM, a warming glow after the dim Petzl lamp. Then you move - darkness, click, click, click - wish I'd brought five FX2s instead.

We were soon all together again and romping off along Jigsaw Passage, past the Misfit and into Big Chamber Nowhere Near The Entrance. A few dry crawls, climb down through St Valentine's and up the pitch (how did they ever get a ladder up there in the first place?). Across the traverse and down the handlines and then the big stuff starts. Looking up at a hole 70ft up in the roof, "Did we really just climb around the edge of that?" A quick stomp along the enormous Time Machine and down into the Bonsai Streamway. Stopping at the Hard Rock Cafe we re-filled the 'bides with water, had a Mars bar break and a drink (this is the last sign of water for quite a way).

Now the serious caving starts. The extensions start with a series of sandy crawls and sand ducks, these are a whole new experience, unlike anything else underground. The sand gets everywhere, yes I mean everywhere! After an hour and a half from the Hard Rock Cafe the crawls end at an extreme squeeze through to a dig - wrong way! After I had tried a very dodgy climb up to a high level side passage and fallen off crushing Kev's BDH tube we eventually found the right way on. We had mistakenly been following the Oregon Trail. Crawling through Brazil, Miami Vice, and Accupuncture (this bit really finishes the knees off) we eventually reached the Micron. We had heard rumours of how bad this squeeze is but it really isn't at all tight. We reached Borrowed Boots Streamway and the bottom of it, what a relief. We refilled the 'bides and washed some of the grit away. Slow, careful progress along Ankle Grinder to what appeared to be 7th Hour Sump. After looking for Jacob's Ladder and not finding it, the only conclusion was that this wasn't 7th Hour Sump, just a duck that looked like a sump. After negotiating this unexpected obstacle the route up to Jacob's Ladder was obvious, a short climb up through boulders leads to La Plaza and The Restaurant At The End Of The Universe. After 12 hours of tough caving we made a unanimous decision that we had no desire to dig at the end of Friday 13th Passage. A quick exploration of the area and a few of the leads was followed by a meal of pasta and soya chilli, washed down with copious quantities of whiskey. The alcohol served two purposes: a celebration of having reached this far, and probably more important, to induce a state of unconciousness until about 8am Saturday morning.

SATURDAY 18TH MARCH, MORNING

CHARTERHOUSE CAVING COMMITTEE AGM

The Charterhouse Caving Committee AGM was held at the Hunters on 08.04.89.

- I John Beauchamp was re-elected as the Secretary / Treasurer.
- t The Longwood lock is to be replaced by an Ingersoll-type lock. The possibility of having a common lock at Longwood and Rhino Rift is to be investigated.
- The membership subscription for Charterhouse Caving Committee will be £10 for 1988/89.
- Any 5-year Charterhouse Caving Committee permits currently in use are no longer valid. Only 14-day and 1-year permits are now acceptable.
- * The BCRA insurance cover held on behalf of Bristol Waterworks does not cover commercial caving, although novice training by caving groups is covered. (ED. What about "no novices" in GB?)
- Member clubs are reminded about their responsibilities when issuing permits. For insurance purposes, this means that the issuing club effectively takes responsibility for any visiting group who use a 14-day permit.
- t The Nature Conservancy Council has begun the process of making Charterhouse and Cheddar "Sites of Special Scientific Interest". When Priddy was designated an SSSI it created problems for caving. Will the same problems arise for Charterhouse and Cheddar, and will access to caves such as Bone Hole be affected?
- # Member clubs of Charterhouse Caving Committee who fail to attend two AGMs will not remain as members and will lose the right to keys.
- I The key for Tynings Barrow can be obtained from Mendip Eggs at Green Ore.
- Charterhouse Centre's membership was renewed amidst disquiet.
- I The entrance gate to Charterhouse Cave is to be repaired by Wessex. A temorary gate has been installed at the dig in view of instability and danger to the unwary.
- \$ MCG still control the Longwood September Rift dig, but no activity was reported for past year. (Clubs failing to make reports face losing digging rights.)
- The next exciting AGM will be 07.04.90

Treatment of Disused Mine Openings



To avoid the action illustrated above:

- 1. Do not litter the bottom of disused mine openings with dead bodies bring your litter out with you.
- If you plan to fill a disused mine opening for safety reasons, it is more acceptable to use a mineral infill.
- If you must fall down a disused mine opening, do not touch the sides as this loosens rubble around the edge making the opening wider and easier to spot.
- 4. Do not attempt to turn triangular warning signs upside-down. This would result in any rubble produced in 3. falling onto anyone below.
- 5. Do not fall head first down disused mine openings as it makes identification very difficult.
- 6. On the other hand, if you fall down a disused mine opening feet first, you will find it very difficult, as well as painful, to climb out.
- 7. When falling down a disused mine opening, remember to warn those who fell before you by calling "BELBOODODOOW". Always use the correct whistle code: 1 blast stop, 2 blasts up, 3 blasts down, 4 blasts (or 1 continuous blast) Oh s**t!
