TURCHASE OF GB It was put to the floor that Bristol Waterworks have offered 17 acres of land, below which lies Charterhouse Cave and GB Cavern. A figure of £10,000 had been mentioned. Two organisations are considering buying this land — a Conservation group and a Company limited by guarantee (formed from Mendip clubs). MCG, as well as other Mendip clubs have been asked to pledge, by May 7th, a minimum of £500 each to help purchase the land. Due to the urgency, the committee decided to pledge £500 subject to the approval of the AGM.

At the AGM there was a great deal of and constructive discussion concludina The guestions asked. discussions were about how much MCG should pledge, pledges with various ceilings, and whether MCG should simply purchase the land outright. Eventually a proposal was put for MCG to pledge at least £500 with a ceiling of £5,000 - it failed on a show of hands. Next was a proposal to buy the land outright - it failed on a show of hands. Finally it was proposed that MCG should pledge £500 now, with another £3,500 available so that MCG would be in a position to make up any shortfall in pledges on the day of the meeting (7th May) - it passed on a show of hands.

Ron Saunders and Nick Gilson, both of whom are solicitors (and members), have spent considerable time looking into the complex issue of whether MCG, being a charity, could legally pledge money to a company limited by guarantee. Ron also wrote to the Charity Commissioners to ask for their advice on the matter in accordance with the 1992 Charities Act. Unfortunately the Commissioners were unable to give us a reply by the AGM. Because of this, Ron and Nick were still unsure how we stood legally, and some members were a bit wary about pledging money we would never see again nor get any return for (it does not even buy us guaranteed access). As a result, Ron has suggested that we pledge £500 with a ceiling of £4,000 SUBJECT TO:

a) Approval by the Charity

Commissioners.

b) Our approval of the memorandum and articles of association or other form of association for the purchasing body which shall include access for all subscribers and the public.

c) Our approval of the draft contract to

purchase.

Note: - The words underlined in (b) are an amendment to the pledge already submitted.

Corrigan and Ralph Diment asked the AGM if the Group would agree to an MCG expedition fund for this year's MCG expedition to the Haute Savoie area of the Alps. With a display of maps, photos and a survey of one of the caves already discovered, they put the case on behalf all interested MCG expedition members. They requested funding for caving equipment that could be used for this, and successive discovery, exploritory and surveying expeditions in the Alps (and MCG expeditions elsewhere). These items would be kept separate from general MCG tackle and would be in a locked expedition store.

It was proposed that an upper limit of £1,500 for caving equipment for expeditions be granted, and that the equipment be kept in a separate expedition tackle store. This was passed on a show of hands.

There was quite a bit of discussion on a possible change of committee structure. It was pointed out that some committee members had a bigger workload than others and that posts should be re-organised so that the work could be more evenly spread. One suggestion was that there could be fewer committee posts by amalgamating some of these and

re-titling them. Any extra work could be delegated to voluntary members. It was suggested, by the committee and the floor, that it would be very unwise and undemocratic to have too few committee members making decisions on behalf of the Group. It was also suggested that there would be a big problem if members volunteering to help were unreliable, or if no volunteers came forward.

It was agreed to leave the committee structure as it is, as it works well at the moment. It can be reviewed at a future AGM if it becomes necessary.

POSTS NON-COMMITTEE It was suggested after the election of Committee posts that non committee posts should also be elected. At the moment, these unelected posts are the Rescue Warden, Conservation and Access Officer, and Journal Editor. It was thought to be undemocratic to simply co-opt somebody without the membership having a say on who represents them in these posts. It was agreed that at the next and future AGMs, a proper election of non-committee posts would take place, along with committee posts. These non-committee members would not be expected to attend committee meetings but could do so if they wished or were asked to.

THE MCG DINNER This year's dinner was an overwhelming success. thanks to the excellent organisation and hard work of Arthur Spain. There were almost 120 members and ex-members. Guests of Honour were Malcolm and Norma Cotter, and our other guests included Mary Cox from the Stirrup Cup (next to the cottage) and representatives from the BEC, the Wessex and the Shepton (sounds like a cue for a song!). The meal was first class as usual and I think the menu satisfied all tastes - I certainly didn't hear any complaints.

interesting gave an Malcolm informative after dinner speech with tales of the Group's beginnings and early days. There followed a brief interval where Arthur asked each table to think up reasons for not going caving and reasons for joining the MCG (see below).

Later Malcolm gave an excellent slide show. He showed pictures of many former members, early cave discoveries such as Cooper's Hole, Ubley Hill Pot, Pinetree Pot, and Upper Flood, the first MCG cottage in Netherwood with no running water or proper toilet, the motor bikes that got members to Mendip and the first car owned by an MCG member. It made us newer members realise how lucky we are today with our purpose-built cottage, modern caving equipment, and better transport. There were many more slides covering the 40 years of MCG, too many to mention here but they were enjoyed by

old and new members alike. Another amusement that had people reminiscing was Joan Goddard's photo stand. Again, it covered 40 years of MCG and there was something for (or of) everyone, old and There were photos of new. people, caves, unusual predicaments, places, special occasions, holidays, cottage building, cottage detonation! - and much more. Thanks to everyone who contributed to the evening, to everyone who came, and to Malcolm and Joan for their excellent after dinner entertainment. # MCG RESCUE PRACTICE, 5TH FEBRUARY 1994

The plan to rescue me started when Joan asked if I was prepared to be a "victim" again, and what cave would I choose? "YES PLEASE — Black Shiver or Gaping Gill". I was told these would be too far away for a Mendip rescue! After some debate we agreed that Swildon's Upper Series sounded good. I said: "The ladders might be a bit hard". "No they won't, we will not be doing them!"

Chris Whittle collected me on Friday 4th February, arriving at the George, Norton St Philip, at about 6pm. After an excellent pint of 6X and a good meal we headed to the cottage and a sociable evening in front of the fire.

No problem with personal gear this year as I'd be able to wear my 6mm wetsuit and borrow my son Simon's Petzl for illumination. John Crowsley organised the routes, the teams of rescuers and the Priddy Green Patrolers to keep watch on our cars. He also posted notices to advise other cavers of the rescue and to "keep clear please", advising them to use the Wet Way.

Being a wet cave I was looking forward to the wetsuit and baby oil (see newsletter No.224!) but John Crowsley proposed that I wear my "Polar Bear" furry suit to stay warm as I would not be getting much exercise. Swildon's was very wet so the MRD advised changing the route to make the rescue less severe! (easier?) They also had several ammo boxes with chemical hot-boxes inside, should I get cold. At the cars I was given some new see-through goggles to wear.

The rescuers had been divided into two groups at the cottage. On Priddy Green, next to the cars, the first team strapped me into a drag sheet having first inserted me in a survival bag and poly-bin liner. They had to undertake some delicate surgery, cutting the bags carefully to attach a lifeline at my groin without making my voice change tone!

During the carry from Manor Farm I was unable to see but I could imagine the terrain by the sounds of our progress. Gloop-gloop-squelch, the sound pausing when the stretcher was rested on a gate or drystone wall. Two held me in balance while the rest got over the obstruction. We progressed noisily until we arrived at the entrance where I was balanced so I could get a view of the stream disappearing from the pool and vanishing into the lower hole of the blockhouse.

John Crowsley despatched one of the team to retrieve the goggles which I had left at the cars on the green. After my carriers had rested and my goggles returned, hauling ropes were attached and we prepared to enter the cave. The stream was blocked off with a board over the hole then I was guided in, down and through the now less-wet black void of the entrance. The water made a smashing splashing sound — a favourite noise that I had missed for several years. It was impossible to see the passage as we progressed, apart from the view of the roof/ceiling (I was not lying back and thinking of England!), but I could hear the stream gurgling and splashing. I could also smell the damp cave and taste the dark. What a lovely aroma and flavour!

We progressed further in, dropping down with the stream. Lots of grunting and straining (and splashing) with frequent reminders "keep him out of the water" and "are you warm?" They had succeeded in keeping me dry so far and very warm. We had arrived at the bottom of the first drop, the skill of the team improving as we progressed. I was balanced on backs to keep me out of the stream in the narrow passage and at one point I was poised on Yvonne's back with her nose 10mm from the water to hear someone say to her "can you get a bit lower?" NO!!

I was carried and dragged and I don't know how, but we were at the bottom of Jacob's Ladder in a good sized stream and I still felt warm and dry. My rescue continued and the stream had left us. The passage began to echo and became very light with lots of lamps illuminating the chamber at the Old Grotto – it was full of people! We had found the "out" team. The stream had rejoined us for the reunion as well.

Two hours IN, how long would it take to get OUT? I was propped up so I could look around and then untied so I could take a blood test (blood glucose level of 6.0 - perfect). Some insulin and pills (not lager) and some food (thanks for carrying my ammo box). When I looked around I could see the chamber full of cavers, a great sight. We had got to the Old Grotto which was very dry when I last saw it but now it was very wet with a big stream running over and through the old stal. The two parties of cavers poised there was a memorable sight. The teams changed over and I was again asked if I was warm. My Polar Bear furry suit and wetsocks were wet, I discovered when stripping off for my lunch break, but I was still very warm. Excellent! The "out" team were

joined by a few of the "in" team and we started to exit, gingerly at first, gaining confidence and skill as we progressed. As we advanced I noticed John Beauchamp talking to the surface on the Molephone, advising Arthur Spain of our progress. I'm not sure where the phone was first used but it seemed to be a very successful piece of high tech. At some point I felt damp — an accident maybe? I put my hand down to find I was sitting in the stream! I was still very warm, like the rescuers who, despite lying or sitting in the stream to keep me dry, were sweating.

The ascent of Jacob's Ladder did not seem to present a problem and I was hoisted up easily (apart from the sweat and water) but I was kept dry all the way out. The Molephone was used to request the board be put back across the stream at the entrance to reduce the volume of water entering the the cave. We then continued out through the blockhouse and arrived back on the surface two hours after setting off. Well done both teams.

I was again carried over (through) the glutinous field, this time towards Priddy Church. I was met by the surface team and given warm coffee and a welcome. I was helped out of my wet clothes and into Chris's car, then taken back to a warm cottage for a shower and a chat.

A <u>BRILLIANT DAY</u> for me, it brought back many happy memories. Thanks to <u>ALL</u> who took part above and below ground, and Helen and Simon, the MRO, the MCG, and anyone else I have forgotten to mention. I can now remember and dream of Swildon's again and recall how it used to look four years ago (my last trip) - THANKS.

P.S. I suggested that my neck needed support on the last rescue practice in GB Cavern. No problems this time; too much water and tighter passages stopped the problem recurring, or me noticing it. I was offered the nice clear goggles several times when they caught up with me but I managed to convince my rescuers that I was not getting wet and liked being able to see and enjoy all the sensations. The drag sheet was very effective for manoeuvring me through the tight bits. Not as comfey as the plastic corrugated tube-like stretcher used in GB, but I think it was easier to bend in the narrow places.

P.P.S. I am looking forward to the 1995 rescue practice, how will I stand the wait?

### EXPEDITION UPDATE

We now have 13 cavers who have paid the £20 deposit, and are thus assured of a place on the Alpine Expedition. I am still awaiting confirmation from another 7 (and their deposits). It seems likely that more people will join us out there for a week. If any of you would like to become involved, it is not too late. The more we have, the cheaper it becomes for the rest of us! # "DIGGERS DAY OFF", DAREN CILAU

1994 looks as though it could be an interesting year for Llangatock Mountain exploration. The various cave- connections are now closer than ever, and in the process lots of new cave has been discovered (ie. Busman's Holiday). Things must be good, as even the MCG have been into new passage in Daren Cilau.

Fri eve 21st Jan Begin the tedious trip to the "Hard Rock Cafe", in the company of two members of "RECK" (Reading Elderly Caving Klub — ex Reading Uni.), Damian Grindley and Adrian Willimont. Have more than the usual amount of epics in the crawl, as I'm taking my monster tackle-bag with me. Several other factors combine to make this one of my worst Daren trips: PVC oversuit, lack of fitness, and worst of all, onion bhajis from the take-away in Crickhowell. Feel sick as a dog all night.

<u>Sat 22nd Jan</u> Look at "New Boots and Panties", just beyond the "Micron". Several people had suggested this as an interesting site, but we weren't that impressed. Maybe the lack of draughts in the cave as a whole this weekend gave us bad vibes.

Sun 23rd Jan Explore one or two leads around "Crystal Oxbow". Damian spots a high-level passage, and climbs up. Incredibly enough, this is virgin passage. We find ourselves in a fine stooping-size passage, with a dry mud/sand floor. Occasional sections of crawling lead us to a sand choke after about 50m. We spend approx. two hours digging this with a crowbar, and gain another 6m. The way on is visible, but requires enlarging. Looks promising, but we are forced to return to camp.

Mon 24th Jan Pack up camp, and head for the surface. Uneventful except for a sense of humour failure in the crawl by yours truly! (My tackle-bag is still enormous, as my Ortlieb bag had leaked on the way in, and I have to take everything back out to dry!!)

We have a vacation of one month, before deciding to continue the exploration.


Fri 18th Feb Lee Hawkswell (MCG cottage warden) joins Chris Seal (CSS/RECK), Damian Grindley (RECK), and me on his first camp. We opt for a morning start (as we can't be bothered the night before), with much lighter loads (only two Daren-Drums per tackle-bag). Chris and I put new ropes on the climbs and the traverse (they've been there for years and years), and instead of entering "Crystal Oxbow" from the "Bonsai Streamway" (the normal route), we head up into the "Meeting Room", collect Steve Allen's digging gear, and head off down "Nameless Canyon". On the last camp, we'd spotted an old rope that drops down into "Crystal Chamber" from the beginning of "Half Mile Passage", so we knew that there was a route down. Unfortunately for me, though, this rope only went half way down. A classic abseil on a rope that is too short can cause one or two inconveniences, and this was to be no exception. I found myself having to swing onto a very loose ledge, and ponder the meaning of life (or the meaning of "life after rescue"). Salvation arrived in the form of Chris, who still carried a short length of rope with him - the remains of the re-rigging rope from the climbs. I was able to attach this to the old hawser rope, and continue on down. The others followed, and we all agreed that Daren is a silly place to take unnecessary risks!

Stomp off down to the dig, attach the aforementioned rope to the top of the 4m climb, and dig until our stomachs tell us that it is dinner time.

Sat 19th Feb Chris and Lee go to "Chokes Away" at the end of "Twelve O'Clock High", armed with the Bosch and numerous batteries. They drill lots and lots of shot-holes in the choke for Gonzo to blow up on his next trip down. Damian and I spend the day in the extension, digging and surveying what we find. We only proceed another few metres, as we really need three people (things are getting tight), but the area is still pushable. Lee and Chris arrive at about 17:00hrs, and we dig for an hour or two more. Spend another quiet and uneventful night camp — NOT!!

<u>Sun 20th Feb</u> Pack up and leave the camp in record time. Have an easy time of it in the crawl (some days are better than others), and leave the real world about mid-afternoon. Thick snow greets us outside, accompanied by the inevitable howling draught that only serves to freeze our appendages even more than usual!

Lee enjoyed himself so much (in hindsight) that he is coming back down again soon, and now wants to come on the DYO camp in May!! The passage is headed for what we assume to be the continuation of "Aggy Passage", beyond the boulder choke. This is a very interesting area, and the possibilities for big cave beyond that choke are incredible. Any other MCG members out there who would like to become involved in these projects? Volunteers always needed.



# A "SUPER SEVERE" ARCHAEOLOGY WALK

Last November I plotted the chosen archaeological sites on the map for this year's walk on 5th March and it all fell into place quite nicely. It was to take in all the Charterhouse sites, Gorsey Bigbury Henge, some Cheddar caves, and other sites in between. Easy peasy! Then I got chatting to Phil Ingold who said that Helen and Simon would be going on the walk and would we be using any roads where he could meet us? Well, the answer was no! It would be all cross-country except Raines Batch Lane at the beginning and Cheddar Gorge at the end. I asked him how much he could do on his motorised scooter and he said most things except walls and stiles as the scooter was too heavy to lift over them.

Unable to resist a challenge, Martin and I set off in early December to walk the planned route and amend it where necessary so that Phil could join us and get all the way round on his scooter. There were a couple of muddy places that we couldn't avoid but we thought that come March they will have dried out a bit. The rest of the route presented no problems. I then wrote to the landowners for permission to cross their land and use their tracks, and in every case this was given very amicably (on the day, one even left otherwise locked gates open for us.)

After two months of extremely wet weather and a forecast of worse to come on the day of our walk, 19 people (and one dog) set off from Nordrach Cottage. Our first obstacle was on the track to Upper Flood. It was extremely rutted and boggy and Phil's scooter needed a bit of manhandling, if only to stop it pitching him sideways into the mud. The Charterhouse sites (the Iron Age enclosure, and the Roman leadmine, fort, ampitheatre and town) were reached without incident and all went well until the track beyond Raines Batch Lane. There were two long stretches of deep water that would have flooded the scooter motor, so Phil was helped over a nearby stile and along a field while his scooter was coaxed through bushes and over rocks until both could be safely reunited further on. The next obstacle was along a path at the edge of Blackmoor — it had disappeared! In its place was two hundred yards of ankle deep bog. The scooter kept sinking into the mire despite much pulling and pushing, so while Phil was helped around the bog, others manhandled the scooter again until dry(?) land was reached. This was quite tiring for Phil and the others and we weren't yet half way along the walk. Whatever would we come across next?

Actually, the rest of the walk went very well, and the scooter zipped across fields and along tracks. We stopped near Longwood and had a well earned lunch, giving everyone (and the scooter) a chance to recover before visiting the Neolithic Gorsey Bigbury Henge. Blackrock Drove gave us no problems, but Phil's scooter was never going to make the ascent to Bone Hole (Bronze Age). Phil continued easily down the Gorge, past various Palaeolithic-Roman caves and rock shelters, but the final blow (literally) came in Cheddar Gorge, by Sun Hole Palaeolithic rock shelter. Luckilly, we were nearing the end of the walk and thinking of nice cool pints in the pub when there was an almighty BANG!!! from the scooter, like a backfire. "It's OK", said Phil, "I've got a puncture repair kit". "You'll need more than a puncture repair kit... you've got a ruddy great hole in the tyre", said Mike Eeles. Helen fetched their car which she had previously parked at the pub, so a final bit of effort got the scooter into the back, and Phil into the pub. Then a happy hour was spent going over the interesting and amusing aspects of the walk.

Although the route was very wet in places, the promised rain didn't arrive so, weatherwise, we were lucky. Everyone said they enjoyed the walk with its archaeology, and agreed that it was made more enjoyable with the challenge of getting Phil (and the scooter) round. Phil said that using the grades of caves he would give the walk "super severe"... and where was I taking him next year!!

My sincere thanks to everyone who came on the walk and pitched in with help when needed — it was as much of an achievement for me that Phil did the walk as it was for Phil. Next year's walk will probably be in the area to the east of Chew Valley Lake, taking in hillforts, a stone circle, a chambered long barrow, and much more. OK Phil?
