PINETREE POT SURVEY

After nearly two years digging above the pitch in Pinetree we came to the conclusion that our squalid bit of passage might actually be heading off somewhere significant. Obviously a survey was called for, if only to prove that we have actually been doing something down there all this time.

The length of passage now means that the optimum amount of digging is done by a team of five people. So with only three of us available at the weekend it was an ideal opportunity to knock off the survey. We surveyed the whole of the upper series starting at the entrance pipes. This was so that the dig could be more accurately placed on the old survey. Furthermore we had realised that the original survey of the pitch head had not placed the ledge, opposite the raw bolt, where the dig started from.

The copious amounts of mud made surveying conditions a little awkward. A lack of clean water meant that the compasses and clinometer were not easily read, and Pintree mud is not that tasty. After the surveying we had little enthusiasm for any digging, so retired to the cottage to draw up a rough survey in the log book.

There has been much speculation as to the relationship between the chamber at the end of the dig and the Fourth Aven in Easy Street. The top of the aven actually lies 23m below the chamber so it is unlikely that there has ever been a hydrological link between the two. The current end of "A Pockhole Lips Way", 19m long, is beyond the extremes of Easy Street. It is heading off at a bearing of 040 deg which is much more to the north than we had presumed. Fifty metres more of passage should see us past the wall, and under the shallow dry valley in the next valley!

The passage at the dig face drops fairly steeply but is heavily choked. It is becoming more rocky than before so hopefully less spoil will need to be removed. We have had some problems with co2 build up so are restricted to only one days digging each weekend. Fortunately the air replenishes itself during the week. The recent wet weather is also making things a little awkward, as a steady torrent pours out of a crack in the roof when it rains. Luckily we have been able to divert most of the water down a 'soakaway' in the terminal chamber. This is the point where we initially dug in the chamber, and had to abandon because it was too wet. All the water drains away in under a week after the rainfall. Digging continues.

BOOKING SHEETS The treasurer has been having quite a bit of trouble over the past year deciphering some of the names on the cottage booking sheets. The booking sheets are a new(ish) layout and <u>can</u> work really well. The problem is he doesn't know who "f***ing bastard" is (though he could guess!), or "Gizmaster", or "the Cowboy", or "the Thief", so please, no nick-names. MCG Tackle A suggestion was made for an MCG away meets tackle store. There have been occasions in the past where two or three groups of members have taken tackle for different away meets that fell on the same weekend, usually taking it at least a week before the meet and returning it a week or more after, leaving little or no useful tackle for Mendip caving. It was decided that as we already have an expedition tackle store as well as the regular tackle store at the cottage, we didn't need yet another tackle store. All that is required is for members to PLEASE CHECK WITH THE TACKLEMASTER before taking tackle for away meets. The cottage tackle is meant basically for Mendip caving but with careful management it should be possible to take it for away meets also.

The Cottage The meeting talked about the visual aspect of the external cottage walls. Apparently neighbours have commented on their dowdy appearance. The walls were designed to need no treatment painting means work every couple of years and pressure hosing forces water into minute cracks which open up with frost! SOUTH WALES MEET, 19TH/20TH NOVEMBER

Geoff Barton, Linda Gates, Joan Goddard, Pete Harvey, Mike and Sue Hazelden, Keith Knight, Ian McKechnie, Brian Snell, Dave Snell and Andrew arrived on Friday evening (some of us having toured the quarry in thick fog before finally finding the SWCC cottage). We were joined on Saturday morning by Geoff Beale, Graham Old, and Yvonne and Martin Rowe.

<u>Saturday</u> Unfortunately the planned through trip from OFD II to I was abandoned due to high water levels and the prospect of more rain to come. After some discussion G. Barton, IM, BS, KK, DS, and Andy set off for Top Entrance and Smith's Armoury.

Meanwhile a second and third party (G. Beale, GO, MH, LG, JG, YR, MR and PH) also went in Top Entrance but made their way to the beginning of Gnome Passage where the way on was to the left down a twisty route through boulders to Salubrious Passage. A small stream flowing over white calcite deposits makes this a pleasant way down to a dry tributary passage which enters from the left. We went along it, past the Trident and Judge formations, through a muddy pool and then further dry passage to a 'cross roads' over Swamp Creek which flows down towards the Main Stream Passage. We continued straight on, through a symmetrical tunnel-shaped walking size passage with quite a few formations, to a pitch of about 30 feet. MH rigged it for SRT; Yvonne and Peter decided to go out, and the rest of us donned our kit (When will I ever get to know the correct order for attaching all the bits and pieces?!). Geoff Beale had a bit of a problem, having left his sit harness behind, but Graham graciously shared his which was hauled up and down pitches as required.

Mike encouraged Linda and Joan at the top of the pitch and we all made it down through the Knave to pitch No. 2 which was about 20 feet long. We scrambled down a steepish passage to a boulder slope leading to a T-junction. To the right there was a narrow deep rift and the main streamway could be heard thundering down below. We heard the sound of voices and wondered if it could be the other party. To the left, past a side grotto with helictites and straws, a hole in the floor looked inviting. It sported a fixed belay, but unfortunately we had no more rope with us so had to turn back. We retraced our route to the entrance, MR and MH derigging the pitches. Both Linda and I felt we had benefitted from the SRT practice (and patience of the experienced members), and vowed to try and do more SRT trips in future.

Sunday Ian had somehow contracted a bad foot since yesterday's trip so he, Linda and Geoff Barton left for home, as did the Hazeldens and Rowes. Andy wanted to leave early so a short trip was called for. We managed a fairly early start and set off to Cwm Dwr Quarry Cave, which I recalled as being a dry trip. Those present were BS, KK, DS, Andy, JG and Clare (SWCC). Within minutes we were flat on our stomachs in a stream. I thought this was the tight crawl, but no! an even nastier passage followed where the roof nearly came down to meet the floor, and we had to garden our way through the gravel, pushing it to the sides as we moved forward. Dave, who was larger than the rest of us, discovered the best way to progress was with a series of wave-like undulations along his body (like a caterpillar!). This way he didn't push the pebbles into a ridge in front of him.

This trip was a route finding excercise using a photocopy of part of the survey which I had fortunately packed at the last minute. We made our way through the Boulder Choke to some larger, dry passages, one with a taped area containing a group of very pretty crystal pools, the crystals being an attractive amber colour. Unfortunately at this point we ran out of time and had to return. The entrance tube, which I had not been looking forward to, was easier to negotiate than I expected, although Andrew said I stood on his head at one point. Shucks! I thought I'd done it all on my own.
