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### **1996 MCG RESCUE PRACTICE IN AND OUT OF GOUGH'S CAVE**

I was delighted to be asked if I would like to be rescued into a cave again. "Yes please! - no chance of Black Shiver I suppose?" I have since been told it is very tight so I must admit that perhaps it's not a good request.

After skilful negotiations by Joan Goddard and Tony Knibbs I was asked: "What would you think of Gough's Cave? The adventure series beyond the show cave?" "Yes please!" It sounded fun. I had only walked past looking up the gorge at the stunning cliffs, but never inside so it would be a new experience. In fact most of MCG had apparently not been into Gough's Cave either. A date was confirmed with Mr Cornwell, Cheddar Caves director, then faxes flowed to and from France, Oxfordshire, and Javelin Office Supplies in Hemel Hempstead.

A smooth drive was had to the cottage, the fire was lit, then an excellent pint of 6X at the 'Fleur-delis' and a nice home-made pie for dinner. We had a night-cap at the 'Castle' then a scotch back at Nordrach Cottage. Finally, I was escorted upstairs to bed (even though Helen was promised that I would sleep safely downstairs!) where Joan very kindly gave me her bottom bunk.

Everyone was woken early at 6:50am when I fell out of bed with a loud bang. My feet had got entangled in my sleeping bag stopping me from leaving the bunk normally. A bump on my head rose quickly and I impressed everyone with my pre-rescue injury. For the resulting headache I took some Co-codomol, along with my other chemical props. (An ex-ray check on Monday confirmed I had no fracture, just concussion!) After a blood test, insulin and breakfast I dressed in my Polar Bear ready for the fun.

Saturday was cold and clear. Due to consevation work Cheddar Gorge was closed to all traffic so Chris Whittle, my chauffeur, drove through Charterhouse, past Tyning's Farm and stables and up the Gorge to a coachpark just past Gough's Cave (which was as far as anyone was able to go). Chris parked the car here after first letting me out in front of Cheddar Show Caves. We had been asked to be there for 10am to pose for Bob Bowen's camera and to be interviewed by the local TV company and Emma and Caroline from The Cheddar Valley Gazette. Donning my harness, Texolex hard-hat and lamp in the very cold entrance was a nice reminder of my caving exploits in cold Yorkshire.

The journalists were surprised at the inside of the cave as it was roomy, dry and warm. The lighting raises the temperature of the cave away from the cold entrance. I had been secured into the drag sheet and stretcher then the fastenings were checked again by the Mendip Rescue Organisation (MRO). "LIFT!" I was lifted and my rescue 'in' began at 11am. The 'in' rescue team then checked to ensure that I was feeling alright and the that the various bits of padding were in the correct places. I was asked if I was comfortable - "Yes" *continued on page 5*

### OGOF FFYNNON DDU I - 25th FEBRUARY '96

With water levels from the recent rain and snow still quite high, we decided on a photographic trip into O.F.D. I

Once inside the entrance we had an entertaining climb up the left wall to reach Column Passage. It is easy to lasso a small stumpy stal with a rope for a handline to make the climb easier. Column Passage leads to a well decorated chamber with a deep pool and nice flowstone formations. Going off on the left hand side is a small wet tube (or large-ish duck) which leads to a superb column from roof to floor which you pass with great care. Further on is a small chamber with an audible connection to the main stream about 30ft below.

We returned to the main entrance passages taking photographs as we moved back to the cave entrance. Here we explored side passages including one which leads to Fault series. This series was at the top of a wet calcited boulder slope. This was left to be explored on the next trip into OFD I.

### **RESCUE PRACTICE - GOUGH'S CAVE** continued from page 1

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The view from my supine position on the stretcher enabled me to see the cave roof and note the dissolved grooves in the limestone. We progressed through the well lit, warm showcave passing some very clean stalagmite flows and paused to smile for more photographs.

We entered the 'Adventure Caving Arena' with its features known as April Fool's Squeeze, the Bottomless Pit and the Hairy Traverse - not easily identifiable as I lay back on the stretcher. They were coated with red glacial clay, and very sticky by the sound of my sherpas' boots.

My security was checked before the lowering started then I was up-ended and the straps were checked. I was then lowered slowly down - a super view. I was rested down for a blood glucose check, some insulin and some almonds. Here the red clay was sandy to the touch and was hard to wash off me and my polar suit afterwards. We changed over to the mainly female 'out' party and they negotiated the hazards efficiently and smoothly. Ascending the pothole was as much fun as the descent but a bit slower as gravity was not a helpful ally this time.

The traverse was interesting and the volume of the groans suggested it was very strenuous, as did the drops of sweat on everyone's brows. My view was limited to a close up of the wire at the top of the hazard but it was not as exposed as I had been told - at least not to me with my very limited view! It was hard to see the obstacles from the stretcher but I was told the squeeze near the end of the cave was too tight so, after much debate, the decision was made to go via the easier route. I was taken off the stretcher and re-positioned on the drag sheet to ensure I'd fit through what was also quite a tight squeeze. I slid through easily on the drag sheet and it did not feel very tight to me - but then I wasn't the one pushing and pulling!

The list was checked to ensure that all 33 people present throughout the rescue had made it to the show cave then we all exited the cave at 2:30pm.


We returned to the cottage for a shower but it was difficult for me to stand under the water so I will have to devise better hand-holds to help me to remain vertical. Afterwards I was taken to the 'Bull Terrier' at Crosscombe for dinner and an ale with Arthur and Lynn Spain, Steve Conquest and Chris, my weekend chauffeur. The drive back was subdued after the day's exertions.

Sunday morning was again cold as we drove to the Hunters Lodge to meet up with the Velvet Bottom Band members of MCG and have an excellent glass of Exmoor Ale. Roger let me send the MS collecting tins round the bar. The weekend raised a total of £28.63 which has been passed to Hemel MS club. Thanks to MCG, MRO, the Hunters, Cheddar Show Caves, Cheddar Valley Gazette, and the local TV.

### **MCG PUBLICATIONS**

• Ron Saunders wrote a letter to the editor, to be read at the AGM, expressing his sorrow at the loss of Bob Speleo from the newsletter and asking if there was any possibility of reviving him! For those who don't know, Bob Speleo was a cartoon character created by MCG member Pete Bulling who used to give Bob (in!)appropriate captions gleaned from members' activities when he (Pete) was a more active member. Bob Speleo was a very popular newsletter inclusion enjoyed by many at the time and Ron is not the only member to comment on his demise. Not much interest was expressed at the meeting but I think that was partly due to the floor being made up of mostly newer members who didn't know him anyway. I will, however, ask Pete if he is prepared to revive Bob Speleo for the many members who would like to have him back, if not, I will seek permission to attempt to revive him myself and see how it goes.

• Ron also commented on the new front page banner of the newsletter, suggesting that it was a bit plain. **MCG AWAY MEETS** "Booking trips in the name of MCG must be done with the knowledge and approval of the committee."

• There was a great deal of discussion about this statement, both at the meeting and later at the cottage. Geoff's point was that if members as individuals or private parties booked caving trips in politically sensitive caving areas using the name of MCG and something went wrong (damage, misbehaviour, trespass or accident), not only does it besmirch the good name of the Group but we don't know how our insurance would stand under such circumstances. Members said that whether they book an away trip either as a private party or as an 'official' meet they were always asked which club they belonged to anyway. There was a great deal of heated discussion about these points and it was finally agreed that the meet secretary will look into the cave situation and publish a list of caves that he or the committee should be informed of for impending trips - Ed. how this would work for spur-of-the-moment trips I don't know. The committee will also look at our insurance policy and let members know exactly what the cover is for any given situation (away meets, local meets, private trips, digging, etc.)

• Geoff also talked about a Chalk mine local to him, near Reading, and how members could get involved in it if they were interested. I will ask Geoff to write an article for a future newsletter with all the details so members other than those at the meeting know what is on offer.

### **CAVING MEETINGS AND EVENTS**

It was suggested that dates and venues of meetings and other events such as other clubs' dinners should be advertised in the newsletter so interested members could put their names forward to attend as MCG representatives or out of interest, or as volunteers to be the invited guests at other clubs' annual dinners.
