

a weekend in Fergianagh - November 1999

Andy, a Yorkshire caver, is a new 'introduction' to the MCG who I met in my local pub in Oxfordshire, but was working on a long term contract in Northern Ireland.

Graham Old and myself arranged a long weekend over in Fermanagh and were met at Belfast Airport by Andy. We stayed overnight in his flat in Coleraine. Saturday morning saw us driving down to Fermanagh to meet up with Les Brown who has been on MCG caving trips in England that I have also been on.

Our Saturday trip was going to be an extensive tour around Marble Arch Cave, but local access problems meant that this was abandoned. Instead we were given a trip into Boho Cave (pronounced Bo Cave) by Les and some of his NI caving chums including a girl called Veronica, who I'm sure has been to the MCG cottage before.

Boho Cave is a small through trip that is reported as very flood prone. Certainly the maze of passages, some up to 20' high, showed flood debris in all sections of the cave right up to the roof.

A small, tight and very muddy passage gave access to some good formations. Andy managed this awkward section, but it was too tight for me. I had to reverse backwards uphill through tight, muddy boulders. Graham called a bad back, so we took photographs of anything that looked photogenic, including Veronica when she returned with the rest of the party!

We had pre-booked a B&B in Enniskillen and drove there in the evening. We went to a pub (as you do) and walked into a free Guiness promotion. Draught Guiness in bottles - whatever next! Graham missed out as his tipple is lager.

On Sunday we went to Pollnagollum of the Boats. This is a massive shakehole entrance not far from Marble Arch Cave. We drove to Blacklion which is just in Eire to fill up with petrol because here, over the border, it was much cheaper (unleaded about 60p per litre).

We drove via the scenic route - Marlbank Loop, which leads to the cave. We were driving along a narrow lane when we were stopped by an armed RUC Policeman who wanted to know who we were and what we were doing etc. We were very aware that he kept his hand on his unholstered pistol all the time.

Suddenly, unexpectedly, a military helicopter took off from a hidden gully behind some trees, then a platoon of heavily-armed soldiers surrounded our car, but we were waved on by the RUC Policeman. After this excitement, going into the cave seemed quite tame!

The large shakehole entrance led over and under some very large blocks to a nasty boulder choke where route finding proved initially difficult. The way on lies to the left and not straight on up a ramp into a very unstable boulder ruckle.

The stream is heard noisily through and below the boulder choke and the trip to the bottom reaches of the cave involve negotiating several lakes where a swimming technique is needed, interspersed with some large, wet streamway. The general direction of the streamway tends across the mountain away from the Marble Arch Cave system.

Once we were all out Andy drove us back to Belfast Airport where we caught the plane home.

Personally, I found caving in Fermanagh good but the best craic for me in Ireland is over on the west coast in County Clare, where over the last 18 years I have enjoyed many good holiday caving trips.

We were running a bit late by now but as we walked the lane from the Charterhouse Centre to Upper Flood, who should come to our rescue but our knight in shining van, Geoff Beale. Thanks to him we got showered and to the Hunter's in time for the AGM after a lovely hour or two of reminiscence.

WESSEX CC CAME TO DEVON : December 1999

Monday 27th:

Bill and I were waiting for Les Williams to arrive with the Wessex crew, to go caving in Devon for a few days. We finally got a phonecall at 12:30pm from Neil and John looking for a key to the DSS hut so they could get out of the rain. Les also phoned to say he was going to be late as he was stuck in traffic - or was it the pub?! When Neil and John arrived we offered to make them a cup of tea which was a bad move as we got much ribbing about tea-drinking MCG members. By now Cookie from the Wessex had turned up.

Bill and I asked if they would like a trip down Pridhamsleigh Cavern whilst they waited for Les. John and Neil had never caved in Devon before so Pridhamsleigh would be a new experience for them. As we entered Pridhamsleigh we took a left hand tunnel coming down the rift and then headed along up into Crystal Chamber. From there we slid through the top left hand hole, then crossed the rift into Junction Chamber. It was here that we heard this almighty noise. Les had arrived! We went down to the lake where we found to our amazement that it had flooded right back to The Cellars, which were also flooded. We headed for The Oxbow where we dropped down into the middle of the flooded Cellars. Les said with a grin, "Let's swim the duck!" We said, "No deal!" so from there we went up the Coal Shute where Neil found he could not get his chest through the figure of eight shaped hole, nor could he move the rock that was stopping him.

Cookie said he would like to see some of the tunnels so we set off to explore a few and ended up at Bishop's Chamber, then over and down into the flooded extension. After that it was time to return to the hut. By 7:45 we were in the Kings Arms looking for Cathy, Neil's other half.

Tuesday 28th:

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We tried to get keys for Plymouth Cave with no luck, so Afton Red Rift was our next choice. Neil's friends, Chris and Theresa, were to join us at 11:30am but they didn't arrive until 1:45pm. We finally got into Afton Red Rift at about 2:45pm but it was only when we had committed ourselves and were going down the entrance rift did I realise that Chris was not going to make it into Afton, or any other cave that day. Once down the rift, Bill had gone on through a tight squeeze with John, Cookie and Theresa. I was left to follow with Neil and Chris, but we found that the rocks would not Neil through (just like yesterday in Pridhamsleigh). He even took off his clothes but it was no good, so the three of us had to turn back. However, Bill's group had a good trip.

Wednesday 29th:

After an early night, Les was feeling better so we decided to venture further and visit Berry Head Quarry at Brixham. Being the smallest, I was volunteered to climb into Hogberry Cave. When I was sent into the cave I had clean jeans on, but when I came out I was wet and dirty. Also, I split my little finger nail, but none of them would put my arm in a sling. Typical men!

Les thought he would go one better by free-climbing up a 12ft cliff face, but he found he couldn't get back down so Bill had to sprint Gazelle-like back to the car to collect the only piece of rescue equipment we had (a rope). Bill threw the rope with immense skill for Les to catch in his shaky hands he managed to get back safely. While all this was going on, Cookie and I were looking at oiled-up sea birds. Later that afternoon we finally got a trip into Corbridge Cavern.



Cottage

update:-

The shop:-

MCG EXPEDITION - 2001

It's probably a bit late to consider an MCG expedition / caving holiday for Summer 2000 now (although I note that Lynn and Bill may be off to the Vercours with DSS, see page 6 for details). However, your Caving Secretary (coopted) has a 12 seater Land Rover which is available for use on a Summer 2001 expedition or caving holiday, provided the owner gives her permission. (I'm sure Yvonne won't object.)

What I would like to do is find out where people want to go in July/August 2001, then arrange regular UK meets in Yorkshire, S Wales, Derbys and even Mendip to allow people to get to know each other, to do some "team building", and arrange any training (SRT, cave photography etc). The Group used to do something similar back in the late 80's and early 90's and we had some really good caving trips to France and Spain, but we were always limited by our lack of an expedition vehicle. Eventually, we bought a Land Rover 90, but sold it after one trip to Spain.

So, where do people want to go? So far, Morocco and Yugoslavia have been suggested:

KEF TOGHOBEIT is the deepest system in Morocco at -677 metres and lies in the Er Rif mountains at an altitude of 1,700 metres. Apart from a 76 metre entrance pitch, it seems to be lacking any major obstacles and offers a sporting trip. Other caves include GHAR ISK N'ZOUAY, 2,300 metres long, GHAR BEL HORDAIFA, 1,200 metres long, WIT TAMDOUN, 11,000 metres long and the GROTTE DE CHARA, 8,000 metres long with a fine river passage. Of these, KEF TOGHOBEIT is the furthest north and therefore the easiest to reach. Unfortunately, the Er Rif region is a cannabis-producing area and has a bad reputation for banditry.

Yugoslavia (or what was formerly Yugoslavia) has 50,000 square kilometres of karst, an amazing one third of its total land area. Bosnia, Serbia, Croatia and Montenegro are probably worth avoiding but we should be able to find something suitable to do in Yugoslavia.
